FLEMING'S \$5000 COUNTY EXPENSE INCREASE

A correspondent in the Philadelphia Inquirer in noting the political situation in Centre county, talks about the same view as does Dorworth's Beliefontic Republican, but adds this feature not mentioned by the Republican: During the two years he has been on the bench Judge Fleming has increased the over-all expenses of Centre county over five thousand dollars annually by new appointments and increases in salaries, and as the money to meet this expense naturally comes out of the pockets of the taxpayers and voters of the county, it is likely they have taken advantage of this opportunity to register an emphatic disapproval.

INJURY TO H. E. SHRECKENGAST RESULTS IN DEATH

Rock at Leister Quarry, Near Potters Mills, Operated by Township, Crushed Chest of Workman.

Hannibal Edward Shreckengast was so seriously injured in a quarry at the Leister farm, near Potters Mills, on Tuesday forenoon that he died almost immediately on reaching the Centre county hospital. The unfortunate man, together with a number of other workmen, was engaged in removing slate from a quarry being operated by the Potter township road supervisors, when the accident happened. A blast had been made previous, which left a section of the slate overhang the breast of the quarry. Efforts had been made to remove it, but no headway could be made, so it was thought safe. Without warning the rock-like slate fell, a large portion striking Mr. Shreckengast, and narrowly missing William Jordan, one of the supervisors.

Realizing the seriousness of the injury to the man, the Centre County hospital ambulance was called. Death was due to an injury on the chest and shock following.

The deceased was a son of Lutser Shreckengast, and was born at Tytersville, June 1, 1861, making his age over sixty-eight years. Mrs. Shreckengast died more than five years ago. There survive these children: Mrs. Ruth Gelin and Mrs. Mary Saxon, both of Greensburg; William, of Dallas, Texas; Paul, of Houston, Texas, and Earl, of Zion. The brothers and sisters surviving are Samuel, of Hollidaysburg; Newton, of Millmont; Harry, of Farmers Mills; Mrs. William Balston, of State College; Mrs. Heavener, of Easton; Mrs. McVaughen, of Philadelphia; Mrs. Edward Heckernell, in Nevada.

Funeral services will be held from the home of Earl Shreckengast, at Zion, Friday afternoon; burial at Centre Hall.

The body was brought here from the hospital by mortician F. V. Goodhart, at whose parlors it was prepared for burial.
