Owing to the interference of traffic on account of rebuilding the Pennsylvania Valleys road, the refreshment stand at Harry John's was closed recently. H. H. Mensch, of Sunbury, conducted the place and expects to reopen it next spring.

The Pine Grove Mills flour and chop mill, destroyed by fire recently, will be rebuilt on a small scale for chopping only, by E. H. Auman. The rebuilding is announced to begin next spring. Mr. Auman at the present time is with his son, Ellis Auman, and wife, at Sandy Spring, Maryland.

Rev. J. M. Rearick, pastor of the United Lutheran church, at Millington, continues to improve from a rather serious illness that came on during the latter part of the summer. He is now able to and does perform most of his ministerial duties, but is not filling the pulpit appointments.

Mrs. and Mrs. Stanley Brooks drove from here to Youngstown, Ohio, on Saturday afternoon and Sunday returned, bringing with them Mrs. Sumner Packer, who will remain here for the present. Mr. and Mrs. Packer live in Flint, Michigan. Mr. Packer accompanied his wife as far east as Youngstown.

The members of the Methodist church at Meadsburg, being served by Rev. J. Frederic Moore, gathered at the parsonage to celebrate the first wedding anniversary of the young parson. At an appropriate period, the fifty-seven members brought forth and stacked the presents for the pastor and his wife.

Frank L. Murphy, general manager of the Central Pennsylvania Gas Company, was in Millersburg in the interest of securing a franchise to erect a gas plant there of sufficient capacity to supply Millersburg, Halifax, Liverpool, Newton and Millerstown. Should a franchise be granted a plant similar to the one erected at Axe Mann will be constructed.

When the official sticker indicating your car has been inspected becomes wet, the printing on it will disappear. To overcome this the State Highway Department has instructed the more than five thousand garages designated to inspect that new stickers be filled out and be put on windshields when asked to do so by car owners. The printing was done over the mudflage, consequently moisture quickly effects it.

State Highway route No. 45 has been properly marked between Old Fort and Pleasant Gap. Hitherto the route between the points named carried but No. 53, and this was highly confusing. Motorists traveling on Route 45 on reaching Old Fort from the east or Pleasant Gap from the west, lost the route number at these points, No. 45' passing over No. 53 between Old Fort and Pleasant Gap. This section of route No. 53 now also carries route No. 45.

Dr. E. L. Nixon, of State College, an expert in growing potatoes, purchased the crop of Mrs. A. C. Keppler, above Pine Grove Mills. The potatoes were purchased in the ground. A car load of tubers was shipped every day for a week and were raised from Dr. Nixon's own farm and the Keppler farm. Dr. Nixon spent several years telling farmers how to grow potatoes, and it was not until he was challenged to put into practice his own methods that he demonstrated his theories correct. He is now a potato grower on a large scale on his own land, and not only that but grows them at a profit that is attractive.

Mr. and Mrs. George D. Hennigh were called here from their home in Birmingham, Alabama, on account of the death of the former's father, S. P. Hennigh. Mr. Hennigh is one of three gentlemen conducting a milk distributing plant in Birmingham. The milk is shipped in the raw state to their plant where it is pasteurized and bottled and distributed to customers in all sections of the city. A similar plant has been built and is now being operated by the same firm in Mobile. Mr. Hennigh devoted some time to the study of agricultural chemistry at Penn State, and from there went to Iowa State College where he took a full four-year course in Agriculture.

The refreshment stand at Locust Park, a State forestry park south of Potters Mills, in the Seven Mountains, has been improved and will remain open throughout the entire year. To better accommodate visitors there during the winter months, the porch extending along the entire front of the main refreshment stand and living quarters, has been enclosed with glass, and other improvements about the place have also been made. The park has had many improvements made to it since last spring, and some uncompleted at this time will be finished next summer. H. E. Brown is the proprietor who will have his first experience in conducting "Brownie's Place" during the bleak winter months of 1929-1930.

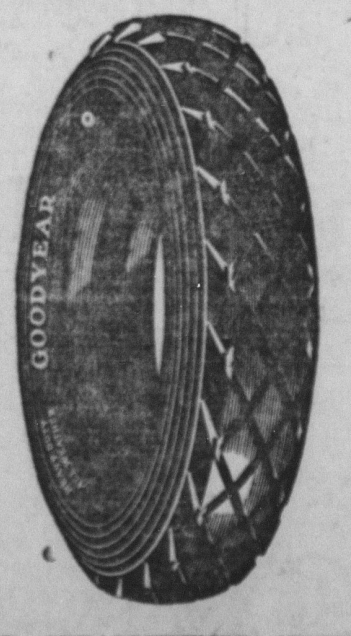
