FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

CUT POOR TREES FIRST—In cutting the annual supply of firewood, the poor trees in the woodlot should be taken first. Foresters at State College recommend thinning out the undesirable trees will also allow room for the good specimens to develop into more valuable timber.

BALANCE DAILY RATION—The amount of protein necessary in a grain mixture for dairy cows depends to a great extent on the kind of hay fed. With alfalfa hay use a grain mixture containing 16 per cent of crude digestible protein. If clover hay is fed about 20 per cent of protein is necessary. Timothy hay requires about 24 per cent of protein to balance the mixture properly.

USE WINTER VEGETABLES—Parsnips and salsify are often left in the garden over the winter and used in the early spring. Why not dig these vegetables in the fall, store them in shallow pits, and have them available in the winter, also?

CULL PULLETS CLOSELY—Rigid culling of pullets in the fall eliminates many birds which will not pay a profit. Feed and care should not be wasted on non-producers.

PREPARE FOR LAMB CROP—If ewes are to have good lambs next spring, they must have proper feed and plenty of exercise this winter.

KEEP FARM RECORDS—A good farm record book accurately kept will enable a farmer to know every angle of his business.

STUDY COURSES AT HOME—Using the long winter evenings to learn more about agriculture and homemaking is a profitable practice. The Pennsylvania State College has free correspondence courses on 41 different subjects. 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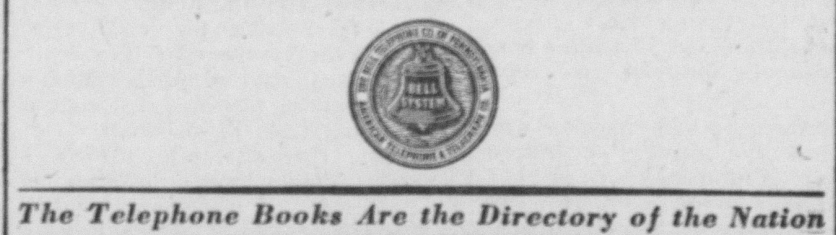
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
