REV. D. J. MITTERLING DIED SUNDAY A. M.

Rev. Daniel John Mitterling died at his home at Madison, South Dakota, on Sunday morning. A message was received here Monday to that effect by his nephew, D. C. Mitterling. Interment will be made this (Thursday) forenoon at La Grange, Indiana, the former home of Mrs. Mitterling, whose maiden name was Miss Laura Norris, and who survives her husband. There also survive the deceased two sisters—Mrs. Sarah Walker and Miss Alice Mitterling, both of Hartleton.

He would have attained his 87th year next April, and was a son of John Mitterling, long deceased. Upon discontinuing the active ministry Rev. Mitterling opened a musical store in Madison and did a very successful business.

The following is reprinted from an issue of the Reporter of March, 1906, and was written for this paper by J. F. Zeigler, of Altoona: The subject of this sketch was born on the Mitterling homestead, three miles south of Centre Hall. Here he spent his boyhood days until leaving home to prepare for teaching, in which calling he engaged for five school terms, in the meantime attending the Millersville State Normal School during the summer. He then entered Missionary Institute, now Susquehanna University, at Selinsgrove. From there he went to Wittenburg College, Springfield, Ohio, graduating in 1889, and from the Wittenburg Seminary in 1893.

He entered upon a post-graduate course in Providence University, and in June, 1884, he received a degree of Ph. D. Dr. Mitterling's first pastorate was at Navarra and Beach City, Ohio, where he met with much success, building a new church and doubling the membership. Lagrange, Indiana, was the next pastorate, and here like in his former fields the membership was greatly increased.

During his pastorate at Lagrange (1895), he left the Lutheran church and by unanimous vote of the Presbytery became a minister of that denomination. At the solicitation of the home mission board he became pastor of the Mission church at Coleman, Michigan. Here he erected a second church and increased the membership four fold. At Centreville, Iowa, he became the pastor of one of the substantial organizations of the southern part of the State.

He was regarded as a strong, logical and fluent speaker, and was frequently sought for addresses on public occasions of local importance. An address on "Our Public Schools" was so favorably received that it was published in its entirety and widely circulated.

DEATHS.

HILE.—Death came quite suddenly to James Otis Hile, of Pleasant Gap, at 2:50 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon of last week. He was a stonemason and was at work building the foundation wall for a garage for Boyd Rachan, his near neighbor. Mr. Rachan was assisting him and did not notice anything unusual in Mr. Hile's appearance or actions. Suddenly he threw up his hands and fell to the ground without uttering a word or even a struggle. A physician was hastily summoned who stated that death had evidently been instantaneous as the result of a severe heart attack.

He was a son of Adam and Elizabeth Hile both deceased, and was born at Pleasant Gap, March 11th, 1866, hence was 63 years, 8 months and 2 days old. As a young man he learned the stonemason and bricklaying trades, and followed those occupations all his life. During this time he constructed himself or assisted in building many stone and brick walls in Centre Hall. His last work in town was the laying of the brick work for the Mitterling bungalow, completed but a few months ago.

Most of his three score and three years were spent at the Gap where he was honored and respected by all who knew him. He was a genial gentleman, kind and accommodating, and always ready to lend a helping hand in any kind of an emergency. He was a member of the P. O. S. of A. and the Heptasoph.

As a young man he married Miss Phoebe Hilger who survives with two children: Fremont Hile and Mrs. Frank Knarr, both of Pleasant Gap. He also leaves three brothers William Hile, of Youngstown, Ohio; Lawrence and Harry, of Pleasant Gap. Funeral services were held at his late home Saturday afternoon by Rev. W. J. Wagner, of the Lutheran church, and burial made in the Pleasant Gap cemetery.

MOYER.—The immediate community of Howard and scores of friends over Centre county are mourning the sudden death of Rev. O. T. Moyer, Reformed minister of Howard. Angina pectoris caused his death at the age of 69 years, 3 months and 11 days. He was a native of Easton and was a son of P. H. and Amanda Moyer. He is survived by his wife, Mary S. Haupt, and three children: Wilbur W. Moyer, pastor of the Reformed church in Boalsburg; Mrs. Ruth Ruff, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Hilda Bechtel, of Elizabethville. One sister, Llewellyn, and two brothers, Edwin H. and Morris D., all of Allentown, also survive. The funeral services were held on Thursday at the Allentown Reformed church; services were conducted by Rev. D. R. Keener, of Centre Hall.

Deceased was a member of Schuylkill Lodge of F and A. M.; Caldwell Consistory A. A. S. R. of Bloomsburg, and I. O. O. F. of Freeburg.

HETTINGER.—John S. Hettinger, eldest son of the late Spear Hettinger, died at his home near Coatesville, on Monday of last week after a few weeks' sickness, aged 58 years. Mr. Hettinger was well known here some thirty years ago, as a farmer on what was known as the Harkok farm, west of Spring Mills. He was the father of six children—two have preceded him to the great beyond. Mr. Hettinger joined the Lutheran church at Farmers Mills when quite young, and was a faithful member of that church up to the time of his death. He was also a member of the Red Men and the P. O. S. of A.

His mother, Mrs. Anna Bell Hettinger, and the following children are left to mourn his departure: Eugene, Ralph, Paul, of Coatesville, and Mrs. Thelma Fisher, of York; also the following brothers and sisters: Geo. Hettinger, Centre Hall, R. D.; Harry and Miss Lottie, at home with their mother; Elmer C., near Spring Mills; Mayme of Florida; Mrs. Ida Long, of Liverpool, and Mrs. John Roush, of Houserville. The body will be laid to rest in the cemetery at York by the side of his wife who died about eleven years ago.

ROAN.—The funeral of George Roan, whose death was briefly mentioned last week, was held from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Norris B. Martz, near Linden Hall, and was conducted by Rev. C. C. Shuey. Interment was made Friday in the Branch cemetery near Lemont. The surviving children are: Etta, wife of Norris B. Martz, at whose home the death occurred, and Levi Roan, of Williamsport.

The deceased was born in Northumberland county, and was aged 79 years, 8 months and 23 days. He lived at Lemont for many years and for a number of years while living there conducted an undertaking and furniture establishment. He was the last survivor of his family.

BECK.—Samuel H. Beck passed away on Tuesday night at his home south of Murrays school house, in Bruce, Valley. Interment will be made Friday morning at Farmers Mills.
