FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from the Pennsylvania State College.

BIRDS NEED EXERCISE—Give free range to the birds which are to be used as breeders next spring. They should also be fed an abundance of whole yellow corn.

HARVEST TIMBER NOW—Timber now is in the prime condition for cutting. When harvested between now and early spring it keeps in good shape longer than at any other time. Markets for timber also improve as winter comes. Firewood, mine timbers, chemical wood, and saw logs are needed.

KNOW COWS' ABILITY—Weigh and test the milk of each cow in the herd at least once a month. In no other way can you tell the difference between cows in their money-making ability, and big variations always exist.

PREPARE GARDEN SOIL—Experience proves that good soil is important and in early plant growing. Soil or manure composts provide excellent material for this purpose.

LIGHTS INCREASE FEEDING—Artificial lighting of layers in beneficial only as a means of bringing about greater feed consumption. With artificial lighting the amount of grain should be increased two to four pounds per 100 birds daily.

TAKE CARE OF SEED CORN—Farm crop specialists of State College report that there is a good supply of seed corn collected for use next spring. With proper protection the seed should be in good condition for planting.

TO HOLD SHORT COURSE—Penn State's annual poultry short course will be held December 2 to 6, and the Horticulture Week program will be offered December 9 to 11. These are opportunities to get the latest information and practice afford.
