COURT NEWS.

(Reported by S. D. Gettling, Esq.) The case of Hoover vs. Hoover on Tuesday forenoon, reached a point where the plaintiff amended his statement of pleadings and the defendant then plead surprise and the case was continued at the cost of the plaintiff. The case of Sadie W. Schaeffer and Harvey P. Schaeffer, her husband, vs. the Borough of Bellefonte, was continued on Tuesday forenoon on application of the defendant. The next case called for trial on Tuesday noon was that of George Miller vs. D. P. Birk; being an action in trespass. This case is from near Reort in Rush township and was on trial Tuesday afternoon and practically all day Wednesday and verdict rendered Wednesday evening in favor of plaintiff for \$535.45. The case grows out of ejection proceedings on the Docket of A. P. Woodring, Justice of the Peace of Rush township, and the defendant being the constable. The plaintiff alleging irregularities, which were denied by the defendant, but the case resulted as above stated.

To Improve Lakes-to-Sea Route in Centre County.

Among the highway improvements scheduled for Central Pennsylvania in 1939 is the new link of the Lakes-to-Sea route from Sandy Ridge to Philipsburg. The highway department is now advertising for bids for the project, which includes the concreting of North and South Centre streets, Philipsburg, and the surveyed route, along the old Tyrone pike through Rush township to Sandy Ridge. The improvement when completed will divert through traffic on the Ocoola Mills route, now followed. It will also eliminate a number of grade crossings.

Road Employees Kill Bear.

Edward Harman, an employe of the State highway department, and five of his companions formed a hunting party for a bear hunt the other afternoon near the new Florida farms in Sugar Valley. They were not on the hunt long until Mr. Harman spotted a large black bear and shot it. It weighed 350 pounds.

DEATHS

TATE.—Minerva A. Tate, wife of John R. Tate, died on Monday at her home in Pleasant Gap from the results of a second paralytic stroke. Interment was made near her home on Wednesday afternoon. Rev. Metzgar, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating. She was aged 63 years, 3 months and 2 days.

The deceased was born at Houserville, and was a daughter of Uriah and Sarah (Houser) Stover. Her husband named above, one sister, Mrs. Aaron Lutz, at Centre Hall, survive her as do also these children: Mrs. Harvey Hoy, Scott Tate, Pleasant Gap, John Tate, Axe May; Louis Snaveley, Zion; Mrs. William Hendershot, Mrs. Perry Gentzel, Bellefonte.

RISHEL.—William Rishel, a well known resident of Lemont, died at his home following an illness of complications, aged 69 years. He was a native of Oak Hill, a son of Adam and Amanda Rishel, both of whom are dead. He is survived by his wife who was Sadie Williams, and these children: Mary, of Harrisburg; Mrs. Joseph Weaver, of State College; and Irvin Rishel, of Lemont. One sister, Mrs. Clara Zerby, of State College, also survives. Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon following his death at the home. The deceased was a member of the Methodist church and the I. O. O. F. Interment took place in the Lemont cemetery.

ELDER.—Calvin Kingsley Elder, well known native of Centre county and former resident of Bellwood, died at the Wilkinsburg private hospital of pneumonia. Mr. Elder was of Quaker ancestry, pioneer settlers in Half Moon valley. He was a son of Abram and Mary Ann Elder and was born at Stormstown, February 4, 1866. When a young man he went to Bellwood and was employed in the Penna. North Western R. R. offices, and later the P. R. R. He was auditor for a number of years. The remains were buried at Bellwood. The widow and two sons, also two brothers, survive.

GLINTZ.—August Glintz, at one time a resident of Bellefonte and proprietor of the Garman Hotel there, died at his home at Newport, Mass., of a complication of diseases, aged about 60 years. He is survived by his second wife, a son, Lloyd, and a daughter, Mrs. Walter Kreitzer, the latter of New Kensington. Mr. Glintz left Bellefonte about seven years ago. The remains were taken there on Thursday of last week and funeral services at the Union cemetery were conducted by Rev. Clarence E. Arnold, pastor of the Lutheran church. The local Elks took part in the last rites over the grave of a fellow member.

SKIDDING AUTO KILLS ONE OF THREE

Harry Miller, 23, of Darby, a Philadelphia suburban town, was instantly killed Saturday when the small Ford coupe in which he was riding, accompanied by L. K. Muhe and William Pichard, of Philadelphia, skidded at the intersection at Dale's Summit and turned over, throwing the men through the top of the car. Muhe and Pichard were not hurt seriously. Miller was taken to the Willowson funeral parlors at Bellefonte, and his two companions left Sunday morning by train for their respective homes. All of the men were employes of the Philadelphia Inquirer.

BUICK MOWS OFF GUARD RAILS AND POLE

A Buick coupe struck and broke five guard posts, and a telephone pole below the big turn, on Nittany Mountain, on Sunday night. The coupe was occupied by four persons, all on the front seat, and were Robert Graham, at the wheel; K. F. Rutherford, S. Loretta Kane and Miss Emily Eckersall, all of State College. All were injured to some extent except Rutherford and Miss Eckersall. The latter, however, suffered much from shock. The driver sustained a sprained back, and Loretta Kane a laceration above the right eye. The driver claims to have been forced from the road by a passing car.

Sedan Upsets Near Old Fort.

Driving a Chrysler sedan, Joseph Cohen, of Lewistown, upset the car on the State highway, one-half mile south of the Brockerhoff farm, between Old Fort and Centre Hill, on Sunday afternoon. With Mr. Cohen were another gentleman, two women and two children, all of Lewistown. The car was badly wrecked, the top being nearly torn off, and through this opening most of the occupants were hurled into a field. Practically all the glass was shattered. Strange as it may seem, none of the occupants were injured beyond superficial bruises and shock. It appears the driver lost control of the car which ran off the road, and in turning the steering wheel too sharply the car darted to the opposite side of the road and upset.

Teams Tie in Dodge Ball Game.

Rebersburg and Centre Hall dodge ball teams clashed in one of the closest games of the season last Friday afternoon, and in spite of the spirited playing of both teams a deadlock was reached at the end of the fourth heat, the score being 9-9.

At the end of the first inning the score was 1-1. At the end of the second each team had scored four points. During the third inning Rebersburg scored three points and Centre Hall was knocked out in two minutes. In the fourth inning Rebersburg scored two more points and Centre Hall spectators stood breathlessly for the whistle which blew in time to give Centre Hall five more points, making the final score a tie.

Rebersburg and Centre Hall played at Centre Hall on Tuesday evening, the home team running up a score of 21 to 9.

New Charges Are Brought Against Two Prisoners.

Two auto thefts have been traced to the men arrested in Lewistown for the robberies of the Harkness Garage at Reedsville, and the auto of Harry Haas, salesman, from which samples of clothing were taken. The men, Clyde Rohland and Charles Griffith, are alleged to have admitted robbing the auto and taking a 500-lb. safe from the garage and rolling it unopened into the canal bed near the cottage in which they were arrested, and Griffith is said to have confessed that it was he who took the car of Dr. O. M. Chambers on October 30 and the car of Charles Cloek of Burgham on November 14. Both cars were recovered.

Victor Elson, who was arrested with the two men when they were found in his cottage along the William Penn highway, east of Lewistown, was released after a grilling by the State officers. It is also believed that the men are responsible for the robbing of the Mt. Rock Mill, where a quantity of tools were stolen on the night of November 14, police said. Rohland is believed to have been the ringleader in the robberies, since his escape from the Huntingdon county jail in September, and police believe that they will be able to connect the pair with other "jobs" in this vicinity. The safe was recovered with the contents intact, but badly damaged from the water.
