HUNTING ACCIDENTS.

As of November 15, sixteen fatal and 95 non-fatal hunting accidents have been authentically reported to the Board of Game Commissioners. At least 75 per cent. of all the accidents have been inflicted by others. Only about 25 per cent. were self-inflicted, most of these occurring when hunters crossed fences or slipped on rocks, and so forth. As of November 15 in 1928. sixteen fatal and 116 non-fatal accidents were reported. For the entire season during 1928, 45 fatal and 238 nonfatal accidents ocurred. The record for accidents this season has reached its highest peak. Even the deer season should not greatly enlarge the present percentage for statistics have proved in past wars that the greatest number of accidents always occur while hunting small game.

FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

KEEP APPLES COOL-Apples keep best in a cool, moist, well-ventilated storage. While it is difficult to secure optimum temperature without artificial refrigeration, opening the storage doors in the evening and closing them in the daytime will help lower the temperature

ORDER CHICKS CAREFULLY-Before placing orders for chicks consider the size of egg, shell texture, and freedom from tint of eggs produced by the stock from which the citicks were hatched. Also take into account the size of bird, freedom from disease, standard type and time required to reach maturity,

BLOOD TELLS IN DAIRYING-Cows are good or poor producers according to their blood mheritance. Do not waste time raising helfer calves unless from good, high-producing cows and from a sire that also is from high producing stock.

GROW PLANTS IN HOUSES-Sash greenhouses are being substituted more and more for the old-fashioned hothed in growing early plants. Better control of conditions is possible in the greenhouse and it offers a good place to work in any kind of weather.

ATTEND POULTRY COURSE-Penn State's poultry short course, December 2 to 6, will give those who attend the latest information on poultry houses, management, diseases, and nutrition, Poultrymen are invited to attend.
