**Bell Telephone Co. Reduces Rates on  
Out-of-Town Calls.**

For the fourth time in little more  
than three years the Bell Telephone  
Co. of Penna. will on January 1 in-  
troduce a schedule of reduced rates on  
various out-of-town calls, it was an-  
nounced today by J. H. Caum, man-  
ager of the company here.

The new schedule will be featured  
by reductions of from 5 to 10 cents  
on the day rates for station-to-station  
calls between points from 60 to 200  
miles distant. Station-to-station calls  
are calls for a telephone by number  
or otherwise, on which the calling  
party does not ask the operator to lo-  
cate a particular person. Day rates  
are in effect from 4:30 A. M. to 7 P. M.

**DEATHS**

**DURST.**—Mrs. Alice Durst died at  
her home here on Thanksgiving day  
morning, after an illness from heart  
trouble. She became alarmingly ill a  
week previous, at which time she had  
assembled in her home the members  
of a class in the Lutheran Sunday  
school, of which she was one, for the  
monthly meeting, and gradually grew  
worse until the end came. Interment  
was made in the local cemetery on  
Saturday afternoon, Rev. S. F. Green-  
hoe, pastor of the Lutheran church,  
of which denomination the deceased  
was long a member, being in charge.

Mrs. Durst was a daughter of the  
late Daniel Stover by his second wife,  
Annie E. Wise. The mother died when  
the subject of this sketch was but  
five years of age. There survive her  
two full brothers, Oscar W. Stover, of  
State College, and Foster Stover, of  
Decatur, Illinois, and these half sis-  
ters: Mrs. Foster Shearer and Mrs.  
William Smith, of Zion, and Mrs. Mer-  
vin Kuhn, of Boalsburg.

The husband of the deceased, the  
late Samuel Durst, died July 15, 1920,  
a few months after the family moved  
from the farm to Centre Hall. Ed-  
ward Durst is a surviving son, two  
children—Miss Annie and Ray—having  
died previously.

Mrs. Durst was aged 74 years, 1  
month, and 13 days.

**MULLEN.**—John F. Mullen passed  
away unexpectedly at his home in  
Bellevue, a Pittsburgh suburban town,  
on Thanksgiving day. One of his three  
sons was about to take him and his  
mother out to dinner, when the first  
notice of the death summons was ob-  
served, and it was but a short time  
until the final ending of his life.

The body was shipped to Bellefonte  
on Sunday and conveyed to Centre  
Hall by Undertaker P. V. Goodhart to  
the Centre Hall hotel, where it lay in  
view for a short time prior to inter-  
ment in the cemetery here, Rev. J. M.  
Kirkpatrick conducting the burial ser-  
vices.

Mr. Mullen for a number of years  
was engaged as a clerk in Bellefonte  
and later at Centre Hall, but for a  
long while was employed in the shoe  
department of the Boggs & Buhl De-  
partment store in Pittsburgh. At the  
time of his death he was living retired.

He is survived by a wife, whose  
maiden name was Miss Lizzie Arney,  
of Centre Hall, and three sons: Don-  
ald, employed by a banking firm in  
New York City; Robert, a salesman in  
Pittsburgh, and Dr. James Mullen, a  
dentist, who lived with his parents,  
Spear Breon, of Millheim, is a half-  
brother of the deceased. There were  
also one or more sisters.

**SNYDER.**—James I. Snyder died at  
his home in Freeport, Illinois, Sun-  
day mornin. Death came unexpect-  
edly and suddenly. Interment was  
made at that place on Wednesday, ac-  
cording to a brief notice received here  
by his sister, Mrs. Earl C. Lutz.

The deceased was a son of John H.  
and Mary (Cottle) Snyder, and was  
born in Penna Valley. He left Centre  
Hall when quite a young man, locat-  
ing in Freeport, where he has since  
lived. He was engaged in a railroad  
shop. He is survived by a wife, a Free-  
port lady, but no children.  
The surviving brothers and sisters  
are David Snyder, Boalsburg; Samuel  
Snyder, address unknown; Mrs. Harry  
Davidson, Midway, and Mrs. Lutz, pre-  
viously named.

He was aged between fifty-five and  
sixty years.

**McCLINTOCK.**—Mortimer W. Mc-  
Clintock, former retired farmer of  
Penns and Nittany valleys, died at his  
home at Washington, D. C., where he  
had lived, for the past two years, fol-  
lowing an illness of complications due  
to advanced age. He was born in  
Penns Valley 81 years ago and was a  
son of John W. and Julia McClintock,  
both deceased. His wife, Luzern  
Kreps, preceded him to the grave a  
number of years ago. These children  
survive: John, of Buffalo, N. Y.; Mil-  
ton, of Youngstown, Ohio; and Carrie,  
an adopted daughter, of Washington,  
D. C., along with these brothers and  
sisters: John, of Philadelphia; Clark,  
of Mill Hall; Elmer, of Johnsonburg;  
Reuben, of Pittsburgh; Edward and  
Mrs. Merrill Dunkle, of Hubersburg,  
and Mrs. Mina Grenoble, of Avis. The  
remains were brought to Lock Haven  
and on Wednesday afternoon funeral  
services were held at the St. Paul  
church in lower Nittany Valley, with  
interment there also.

**RENNER.**—Charles M. Renner, aged  
57 years, Lewisburg councilman, died  
at his home on North Third street,  
early Friday morning, following a  
stroke of paralysis.

Mr. Renner was born in Union coun-  
ty and had resided there for the last  
fifteen years. He served a term as  
sheriff at one time and at the time  
of his death in addition to being a  
member of the council was foreman  
of the State road work in that section.  
He is survived by his wife and two  
daughters: Mrs. Harry Gill, of Lewis-  
burg, and Pauline Renner, at home.  
The latter for a number of years has  
been a frequent visitor at the home  
of Mrs. Emma Emerick, in Centre  
Hall. His father, Peter Renner also  
survives.

Funeral services were held at his  
home Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock,  
in charge of the Rev. H. H. Rupp,  
pastor of the Reformed church, of  
which Mr. Renner was a member, and  
interment made in the Mazonia cem-  
etery.

The borough school board reorgan-  
ized at a meeting held on Monday eve-  
ning, at which time Rev. J. M. Kirk-  
patrick was sworn in as a member of  
the board, to serve for a term of six  
years. J. G. Dauberman was re-elected  
president for the ensuing year, and  
C. A. Spyster vice-president. Edw. E.  
Bailey was retained as secretary of  
the board.
