METHODISTS "OVER THE TOP"

Debt Paying Campaign Ended With Snug Sum Beyond Amount Required.

Central Pennsylvania Methodist Episcopalians came to the end of their debt paying campaign with a total of \$233,297, reported up to midnight, Wednesday, at which time the campaign officially ended. Dr. W. G. Murtoff, State College, Thursday morning reported all reports in his hands tabulated.

Altoona district, with which this section is connected, stood first in the list, the figures being as follows: Altoona district, \$62,220.92; Williamsport district, \$59,651.48; Harrisburg district, \$55,939.06; Sunbury district, \$55,485.67. It is expected that the totals for all the districts will be increased when later returns reach the treasurer. Altoona district is likely to have \$3,000 more.

The campaign was a business proposition to pay indebtedness on the Methodist Home for the Aged at Tyrone, Methodist Home for Children near Mechanicsburg, and the Wesley Foundation building at State College.

The campaign was featured by the large number of small gifts, the number of subscribers being more than 10,000. Pledges are payable in installments.

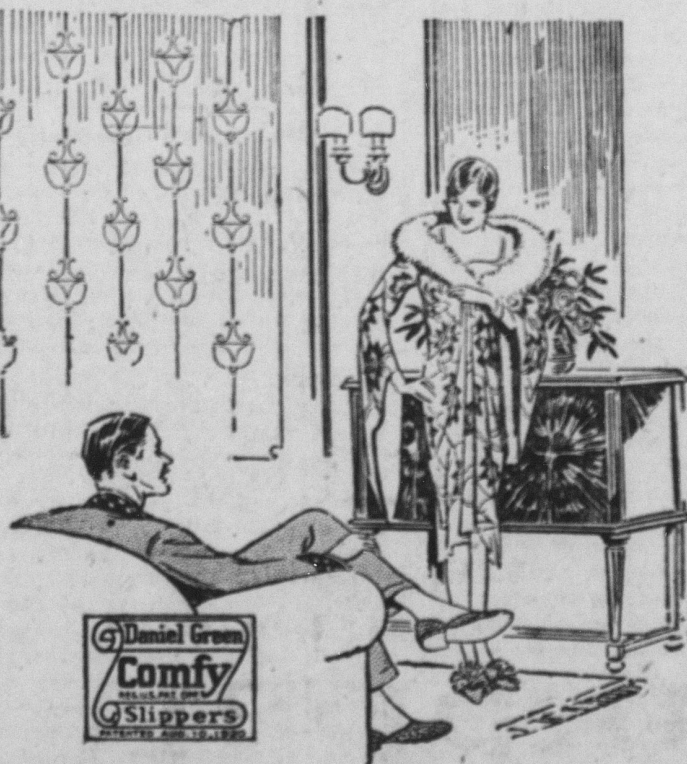
