**DEATHS**

**HUTCHINSON**—Harry L. Hutchin-  
son, one of Bellefonte's best known  
railroad men, died suddenly of heart  
disease at his home in that place on  
Sunday morning. He had just returned  
from a walk to a news stand, and was  
reading in his chair when seized with  
an attack which was fatal before medi-  
cal assistance could reach him.  
Funeral services were held from the  
home and interment made at Belle-  
fonte on Tuesday.

Mr. Hutchinson was a son of James  
and Margaret (Hughes) Hutchinson,  
and came to Bellefonte from Harris-  
burg many years ago. For a period of  
forty-six years he was ticket agent of  
the Pennsylvania Railroad company,  
and on the first of October had been  
placed on the pension list. He was  
never married. The Hutchinson fam-  
ily consisted of the deceased, his mother  
Mrs. Margaret (Hughes) Hutchinson,  
a native of Potters Mills, and a sister,  
Miss Fannie Hutchinson.  
The deceased had attained his sixty-  
ninth year in May of this year.

**REEDER**—Mrs. Elizabeth Gotwalt  
Reeder, aged about 70 years, widow of  
Col. Wilbur F. Reeder, of Bellefonte,  
passed away at her home in Pasadena,  
Calif., following a prolonged illness.  
Her death was the result of a general  
breakdown.

Col. Reeder died about twenty years  
ago and several later Mrs. Reeder went  
to California to make her home. She  
is survived by one son, J. Wallace  
Reeder, Pasadena, Calif., and one half-  
sister, Mrs. Mary Borches, of Knoxville,  
Tenn.

Funeral services were held at the  
home in Pasadena. The body was cre-  
mated and at some future time the  
ashes will be brought to Bellefonte  
and buried in the Reeder lot in the  
Union cemetery.

**WEAVER**—Mrs. Fannie K. Weaver,  
wife of John A. Weaver, died at her  
home at Pleasant Gap, on Thursday,  
from apoplexy. She was the daugh-  
ter of Jacob and Catharine (Malzer)  
Mowery, and was born January 17th,  
1873, making her age almost fifty-six  
years. She is survived by her hus-  
band and three children, namely:  
Glenn, with whom the parents lived;  
of Pleasant Gap; Merrill, also of Pleas-  
ant Gap, and Mary, wife of Harry Eck-  
enroth, of Bellefonte.

Interment was made Saturday af-  
ternoon at Pleasant Gap.

**RISHEL**—Mrs. Mary Catherine Rishel,  
widow of William Rishel, died at the  
home of Ward C. Krape, residing  
near Zion, after several years illness.  
She was 72 years of age and was a  
member of the Evangelical church for  
many years. She is survived by one  
brother and one sister, Wm. Kiestler,  
of Clintondale, and Mrs. Elmira Ohl,  
of Bellevue. Brief funeral services were  
held at the Krape home and the corte-  
ge proceeded to the Evangelical church,  
at Clintondale where funeral  
services were held at 10 a. m. in  
charge of Rev. Jacob Zang, assisted by  
Rev. T. R. Husler. Burial in St. Paul's  
cemetery along the State highway  
near Lamar.

**GRAY**—Miss Esther Gray, of Half  
Moon Valley, died at the Centre Coun-  
ty hospital as the result of a surgical  
operation performed ten days previ-  
ously.  
She was a daughter of Isaac and Sara  
Leggett Gray, and was born in Half  
Moon Valley on the Gray farm. She  
received her early education in the  
public schools, near her home, and was  
later graduated from the Dickinson  
seminary.

She is survived by two sisters: Mrs.  
Frank Hartsock, of Scranton, and Mrs.  
George M. Glenn, of Bellefonte, R. D.  
The deceased was a member of the  
Methodist church since childhood and  
an ardent worker in same, also a leader  
in the temperance cause.

Funeral services were held at her  
home Wednesday morning of last week  
conducted by Rev. Charles Fuller. Bur-  
ial was made in Grays cemetery.

**TRESSEL'S J. OF P. COURT.**

Cases Heard Before Justice J. L. Tres-  
sel, Spring Township Officer.—Au-  
tomobile Law and Liquor Viola-  
tions—Bandit Getter Gets Bride.

Wm. Swancer, Snow Shoe Twp., vi-  
olation of liquor laws; prosecutor, Leo  
Bodon. Raid made Dec. 12. Defend-  
ant held for court under \$1,000 bail  
which was furnished before J. L. Tres-  
sel, Justice of Peace.

George Palenkas, of Clarence; pros-  
ecutor, C. I. Gross, State Highway pat-  
rolman. Hit and run driver, Boggs  
township, Dec. 14th. Hearing Dec. 16.  
Held for court under \$400 bail, which  
was furnished. Was in jail over Sun-  
day. Hit three cars in all.

Gilbert S. M. Morgan, Bellefonte;  
prosecutor, L. G. Runk, Hoffman's Tea  
Cream Co., Tyrone. Passing a worth-  
less check. Held for court under \$200  
bail which was furnished. Arrested by  
Chief of police Dukeman on Dec. 14.

Fred Meyer, J. A. Wilson, both of  
Bellefonte, arrested by Policemen Gross  
and H. C. Pfaffle, State Highway Pat-  
rolman, at Pleasant Gap, Dec. 13th,  
at home of H. C. Decker, for disorderly  
conduct. At hearing Dec. 12th, each  
plead guilty and were fined \$10 and  
costs. At the same time a quantity  
of liquor was found on the person of  
Gander Meyer which was turned over  
to county detective Boden, who charged  
him with possession and at a hearing  
later Meyer entered a plea of guilty  
and was held for Feb. court under  
\$1000 bail, which was furnished.

John Reed, Bellefonte, was arrested  
by Policemen Gross and Pfaffle and  
Constable McDowell, of Pleasant Gap,  
who held defendant and turned him  
over to the State Patrol on a charge  
of operating a motor vehicle while un-  
der the influence of intoxicating li-  
quor, having collided with the car own-  
ed A. H. Ulrich of Altoona. At a hear-  
ing Dec. 16, before J. L. Tressel, de-  
fendant was held for Feb. court under  
\$400 bail, which was furnished. Defen-  
dant was in jail over night.

Walter and Ralph Hill were in jail  
over Sunday charged by Policemen  
Gross and Pfaffle with disorderly con-  
duct, and at a hearing Dec. 16, each  
entered a plea of guilty and were fined  
\$1.00 each and costs. Walter Hill was  
later given a hearing for reckless  
driving and hit and run driver, and  
was given a hearing same time, and  
was fined \$10.00 for reckless driving  
and paid the damages and was re-  
leased.

A. L. Baum, Bellefonte, appeared be-  
fore Squire Tressel, where he entered  
a plea of guilty to reckless driving  
preferred by Jacob Shook, Bellefonte.  
Accident occurred at Linn and Alle-  
gheny streets on Nov. 22d.

Henderson and Eva M. Kennedy were  
united in marriage by Squire J. L.  
Tressel; witnessed by Wm. M. Dunkel  
and Mrs. Tressel. Several months ago

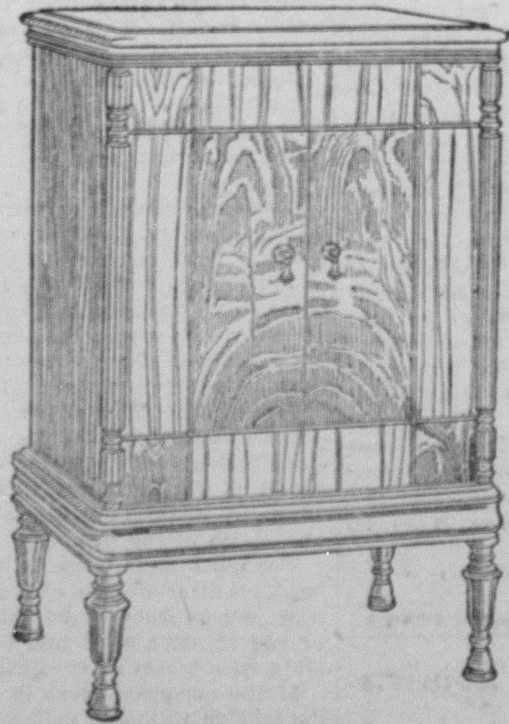

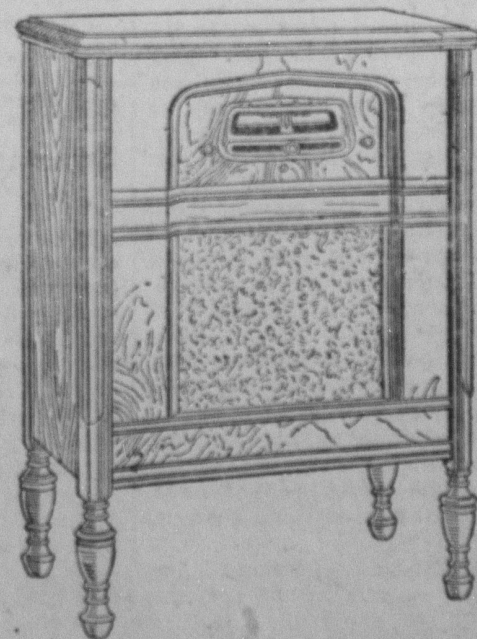
