For seventy years she was a member of Penns Creek Lutheran church. In 1850 she married M. H. Guise. They built a home in Penn Hall and always lived there. She had four sisters and six brothers and lived longer than any of them.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon and burial made in the Heckman cemetery, east of Spring Mills. She was a member of the Lutheran church, and services were conducted by Rev. Louis V. Leshner.

PETERS.—Mrs. Susan A. Peters, widow of the late Emanuel Peters, died at her home at Pine Grove Mills. She was a daughter of George and Rebecca Fye Zettle, and was born in Potter Township. She had reached the age of 77 years, 5 months, and 12 days. 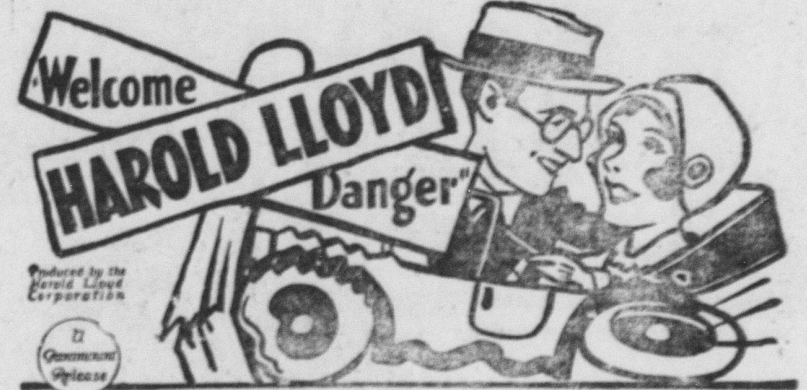
