Washing Wheat to Remove Smut

Single or Double Cylinder Device Is Favored for Treatment.

of Agriculture.) Washing smutty wheat with a single or a double cylinder wheat washer, is recommended for removing smut from wheat for commercial purposes, domestic shipments, and export, by the United States Department of Agriculture following experiments made by grain marketing specialists of the bureau of agricultural eco-

Advantages of Removing Smut. Removing smut from wheat at an early stage in the handling of the wheat after threshing, the specialists say, avoids the complications that frequently arise in connection with docking and discounting for presence of smut, eliminates at the earliest possible moment the extra handling and special binning required for smutty wheat, prevents clean wheat from becoming contaminated at places where smutty wheat is handled, and prevents an increase in the smut dockage resulting from the handling that smutty wheat receives in transportation and

in elevators. Stinking smut is found to some extent wherever wheat is grown in the United States, but is especially prevalent in the wheat-producing sections of the Pacific coast, where dry farming is practiced. Wheat must be thoroughly cleaned of all smut before it is milled into flour, inasmuch as any attempt to mill smutty wheat without removing the smut results in disagreeable odor and poor color in the flour produced.

Unsafe to Blend. It is usually considered unsafe to blend even slightly smutty wheat with clean wheat in an attempt to "work off" some smutty wheat without cleaning it, because there is danger that the smutty wheat so blended will cause the whole mixture to be classified and graded as "smutty." The only safe procedure is to clean the wheat regardless of the quantity of smut it contains, and whether it is to be used directly for milling or is to be sold as wheat.

A publication on this subject, Circular No. 81-C, "Removing Smut from Pacific Northwest Wheat by Washing," has just been issued by the United States Department of Agriculture. While the supply lasts, copies may be obtained free by making request of the office of information, the department, Washington, D. C.

Low Temperatures Cause

of Winter Wheat Losses Low temperatures cause nearly as great losses to the winter wheat crop as all wheat diseases combined, says the United States Department of Ag-

Experiments were conducted by the department over a six-year period on the hardiness of 11 varieties of winter wheat as compared with the standard variety Kharkof. The department found that Minhardi, Buffum No. 17, Minturki, and Odessa are considerably more cold resistent than Kharkof.

Buffum No. 17, Minhardi, and Odessa are soft wheat and are not commercially grown, but are useful to breeders. Minturki is a hard wheat and is grown commercially, particularly in Minnesota. Turkey (Minn. No. 1488), Beloglina, Kanred, and Nebraska No. 60 also were found to be somewhat more hardy, and Nebraska No. 28 and Blackhull much less hardy than Kharkof.

Right Floor Space for

Best Results of Flock For best results, the flock should be limited to 20 or 30 birds, with two square feet of floor space allowed for each fowl. To prevent dirt and waste, feed troughs should be so built that

the birds cannot walk in them. Attention should be called to the fact that birds "off condition" or of low vitality cannot be fattened profitably. Before the birds are placed in the crates, they should be treated for . lice. Clean, mite-free quarters are necessary to insure keen appetites, the keynote of successful fattening.

Well fattened birds are worth more a pound than range stock, due to the improved quality of their flesh. This increase in price, together with the increase in weight, makes it profitable to fatten surplus stock before selling.



ROAD BUILDING TO GET NEW IMPETUS

Highway Officials Make Plans in Line With President's Program.

Impelled by forces now getting behind public work of every character, and especially under the leadership of President Hoover, plans are in the making for increased activity in road building as one of the most far-reaching and constructive agencles in na-

tional progress. In preparation for this objective, and for the consideration of other matters concerning highway improvement, members of the American Association of State Highway Officials have just held their regular annual meeting at San Antonio, Texas. This body is composed exclusively of highway officials who represent every state in the Union, and who also co-operate closely with the federal government in the administration of federal aid. At this meeting, legislative and financial needs In highway work for the immediate future were discussed and a resolution was passed recommending to congress that the federal aid appropriation be

Increased to \$125,000,000. Federal Aid Project. In carrying on their part of the nation's work, highway officials are stressing the importance of completing the main federal aid project as originally planned. This plan, it will be recalled, was to complete state and interstate routes first in order to save motor vehicle revenues from the drain of excessive repair costs where roads are not built sufficiently strong in the first instance to sustain heavy traffic.

As to the wisdom of proceeding with increased activity on the original program, those in highway leadership assert that they are in line with President Hoover's engineering views on such matters. These views were expressed in one of his pre-election speeches at St. Louis and again on his recent visit to Cincinnati and Louisville in connection with waterway improvement. Tersely stated, it was the President's expressed judgment that trunk line waterways should be improved first, and highway officials in their recent conferences at San Antonio have again attested to the soundness of that principle as a means of con-serving and making the safest possible use of highway construction capital.

Use of Highways. Taking the country as a whole, the use of public highways is increasing at an amazing rate, likewise motor vehicle operating waste is increasing where highways have not yet been brought up to modern standards in construction. This situation may be taken as a lesson that not only should there be no let up in road building, especially on routes that are heavily traveled, but that public work of this character should be intensified. It may be taken also as a reminder that there should be no evasion of the obligation due to motorists who have acquiesced in gasoline tax levies in the various states upon the assurance that the main traffic channels of the country would be pressed to completion as early as possible and thus take care of between 75 and 85 per cent of the country's traffic before attempting to stretch the federal aid principle beyoud its present scope.

With the initiative which President Hoover is taking in all internal improvement matters, it is expected that highway building soon will be greatly increased and thereafter maintained at a speed that will insure not only sustained employment in that particular field, but great profit to the country.



Builder Must Remember

Years May Bring Change Land is said to be developed to its highest and best use when the structure on it produces a larger return than any other building would produce, but it should be noted that this return must have a reasonable persistence. In other words, in the case of a home site, the owner should assure himself that the house he is building on it will return the satisfaction and enjoyment described above for a good long period of time.

Land that is developed today with a home of exactly the right type may fall in the path of a city's industrial progress, and, as this encroachment closes around it, the home becomes less and less the best structure for the plot and its value as a homesite decreases. At the same time, with the change in the character of the neighborhood, the amount of satisfaction and enjoyment secured from the home is decreased until perhaps the location becomes unbearable, when all satisfaction and enjoyment disappears. Of course, the loss of value in such a property as a homesite may be offset eventually by an increase in value for an industrial or commercial site, but this rise in value does not usually come about at once. There is a period of transition, when the neighborhood is declining as a residential site and yet has not yet ripened to maturity as a commercial area. Moreover many people who establish permanent homes do not like to see such changes even if they bring about higher values, nor do they like to move out of districts that have become home to them.


