DEATHS

TRESSLER.—Jonathan Tressler, one of the staid and substantial citizens of Harris township, where he was born and reared, passed away at his home above Oak Hall Station on Thursday morning of last week. He had been falling in health for three or four years, growing weaker and weaker as the weeks and days passed until the final end came.

Interment was made Monday afternoon, at Boalsburg, Rev. W. W. Moyer, of the Reformed church, having the funeral in charge.

Mr. Tressler was a son of Isaac and Sarah (Dauberman) Tressler, and was born on the farm on which he died.

He devoted his entire life to agriculture, having lived on one of the Baker farms, and later on the Boal farm at Boalsburg before locating on the old homestead. His wife, long deceased, was Miss Alice Rupp before marriage.

An only son, William Tressler, lived with his father on the farm.

J. Wesley Tressler, of Centre Hall, Calvin Tressler, Detroit, Michigan, and Mrs. John Getz, Lemont, are surviving brothers and sister of the deceased.

He was aged 74 years.

EVY.—Henry Evy, long a resident of College township, a stone mason by trade, living at Millbrook, east of State College, died at the Centre County Hospital on Tuesday. Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock and interment made at Boalsburg. The deceased was aged some eighty years. There survive him four children: Mrs. Al. Grove, Bellefonte; Mrs. Maggie Williams, Millbrook; Robert Evy, Bellefonte; Wade Evy, Pleasant Gap. Mrs. Evy, whose maiden name was Painter, is deceased.

MEYER. Garrett L. Meyer, who for some years past has made his home at State College, died in Philadelphia, on Sunday a week ago under peculiar circumstances. Meyer, who had lately been working in Philadelphia, had a stop-son, Frank Foreman, who is subject to epileptic fits. Meyer had told the boy's mother that the next time he took a fit she was to send him to him in Philadelphia. Consequently she sent Frank and his brother Joseph down, on Sunday Mr. Meyer was walking along one of the streets of the city when he noticed a commotion on the sidewalk. He went to see what had happened and when he got there he saw Frank lying in the pavement in a fit. With the exclamation, "My God, it's Frank!" Mr. Meyer also collapsed. An ambulance was summoned and the man and boy were rushed to a hospital, but Meyer was dead when the doctors examined him. A heart attack was assigned as the cause.

Deceased was a son of Harry S. and Mary Katharine Meyer and was born in Williamsport 43 years ago. He served in France during the World war and was gassed. On his return home he was one of the veterans who went to State College in the rehabilitation course. There he met Mrs. Elsie (Foreman) Glenn and they were married some eight or nine years ago, continuing to make their home at State College. Surviving him are his wife and two children, Sarah and Garrett Jr. He also leaves three step-sons, Frank, Joseph and Linn Foreman, as well as his mother, living in Williamsport and two sisters, Mrs. Emily Seamon, of Williamsport, and Mrs. Margaret McFarlane, of Montreal, Canada. Mr. Meyer's brother, Walter Meyer, died several years ago in a similar manner.

The remains were taken to State College where funeral services were held at his late home at 9:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning of last week, after which the American Legion took charge of the body and conveyed it to Williamsport for burial.

JOHNSTON.—Mrs. Lillie Alken Johnston, wife of George Johnston, died at her home at Beaver Falls, on Monday. Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon and interment made at Beaver Falls.

The deceased was the daughter of John and Ada (Odenkirck) Alken, both deceased, long residents of Bellefonte. She is survived by her husband, two sons and two daughters. One daughter was killed last fall in an automobile accident. A sister, Miss Emma Jan, of Cleveland, Ohio, also survives.

Mrs. Johnston was aged about sixty years.

ROTHROCK.—Complications, from which she suffered for the past five years, caused the death of Mrs. Ida Rothrock, one of Phillipsburg's best known and most worthy residents, on Friday night.

Funeral services were held at the home, 318 Ninth street, at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, with her pastor, Rev. S. B. Evans, of Trinity Methodist church, in charge. Interment in the Phillipsburg cemetery.

Mrs. Rothrock, a resident of Phillipsburg for about sixty years, and for twenty or twenty-five years in charge of a store in the Third Ward of that town, was born at Oak Hall Station, May 13, 1861. Her parents were William and Sarah Hess, for years residents of the town and now deceased. On Jan. 19, 1886, she was united in marriage to Cyrus J. Rothrock. The husband died thirty-one years ago. After her father's death Mrs. Rothrock successfully conducted the store he founded, as noted above. She was a devoted member of the Methodist church and possessed many commendable christian virtues.

One daughter, Eva, wife of Charles Norris, survives, along with two grandchildren, and one brother—Frank Hess—of Los Angeles, Calif., also survive.
