William H. Brown, manager of the Centre County Hospital, gave his fourth annual dinner to the hospital trustees and guests on Tuesday evening at the Penn-Bell hotel.

Mr. Brown was first called on and in his remarks paid tribute to the hospital board acting at the time the name was changed to the Centre County Hospital and the building of the new wing.
