Lost Epileptic Creates Stir in Bellefonte.

A posse of about fifty men, including firemen, under the direction of Sheriff Harry E. Dunlap, on Thursday night searched Bellefonte in an effort to locate Herbert Miller, aged about 55, who was believed to have been overcome with an attack of epilepsy while returning from downtown. The temperature was near zero, and it was feared he would freeze. Inmates of the county jail were temporarily released to join in the search, and the lights of automobiles and the fire company's sumpster used to aid in the hunt. The Union cemetery was searched.

About 3 o'clock Friday morning, members of the Solomon Poorman family, awakened by the fire alarm sounded to call out additional searchers, discovered Mr. Miller in a coma in a room of their home where he had been seized with an epileptic attack. He had no recollection of how he got there.
