Shipping Cows.

D. G. Mitterling has been buying cows for Fred Fisher, of Collegeville, and this week Mr. Fisher will be here himself and aim to purchase a sufficient number for the old established cow market in the Montgomery town named. This will make the first car load of cows to be shipped out from the valley in three years. During this time, however, numerous car loads of cows have been shipped here and sold, reversing the former custom. For many years Centre county cows held a preferred place in the eastern market, the growing of them having been a source of much revenue to Centre county farmers. Among the local buyers who made it an almost exclusive business of buying and shipping fresh cows was D. C. Mitterling, his father, the late William Mitterling, Samuel Slack, Alexander McCoy, David C. Runkle, and Daniel C. Keller. During the times these buyers were active, many buyers from the east came into the territory, causing competition to the advantage of the farmer and oftentimes detrimental to the buyer as he discovered when his purchases were resold in the east. It was customary then for the buyer to accompany each shipment and this frequently proved expensive.


