Grand Jury in Session.

L. L. Weaver, of Penn township, was named foreman of the grand jury in session at this time. District Attorney John G. One of the items requiring time, after the bills of indictment have been found true or ignored, is the viewing of the public buildings and making a report as to their condition.

Evangelical Conference to be Held in Sunbury.

Annual sessions of the East Pennsylvania Conference of the Evangelical Church will open on Wednesday of next week in the First Church, Sunbury. The conference was formed a year ago by merging the East Pennsylvania United groups with a total membership now of 18,000.

Bishop S. C. Breyfogel will preside and Bishop M. T. Maze will be present at the sessions. The presiding elders of the three conference districts, the Revs. W. L. Bollman, T. L. Wentz and E. E. Stauffer, will give their annual reports.

The Evangelical church has twenty-six annual conferences in the United States with a membership of 221,000 and a total membership, including missions in China, Japan, Africa, Latvia, and France of 249,000, and a Sunday school enrollment of 396,000. The church has three colleges and two theological seminaries, two publishing houses, five homes for the aged and two orphanages.

The Evangelical church, having brought its two groups into a denominational union, and is sympathetic towards the movement now for organic union of groups of like faith and policy as the best approach to the solution of the problems of unnecessary duplication in denominational activities, according to Bishop Breyfogel.
