Boalsburg Will Hold Toxin-Antitoxin Clinic, March 8, 15, 22.

The nursing activities committee of the American Red Cross will hold a toxin-antitoxin clinic in the Boalsburg Vocational School on Saturday, March 8, 15 and 22, starting at 1 P. M. This will be free to all children between the ages of six months and 16 years. The doses will be administered by local physicians. Every parent is urged to take advantage of this for the safety of their children. This clinic includes all the children from Linden Hall, Oak Hall, Branch, Shingletown, and Tusseyville.

Diphtheria is the most deadly of the diseases of childhood. Six years ago it was attacking from 15,000 to 20,000 each year in Pennsylvania and was killing from 1,500 to 2,000 each year. It is present at all seasons and attacks all classes. Both the number of cases and the number of deaths have been reduced by more than 60 per cent in six years.

Toxin-antitoxin will establish a lasting immunity against diphtheria. The immunity, established in childhood, will protect against diphtheria until young adult life, when in 75 per cent of persons, natural immunity is developed. Susceptibility to diphtheria increases from the sixth month to about the 6th year. Children under eight years are so susceptible that all should have toxin-antitoxin, followed later by the Schick test. The toxin-antitoxin is given in three weekly doses.

Garman House Not Sold. The Garman House, in Bellefonte, a well known hostelry in Central Pennsylvania, was offered at public sale by the August Glintz estate on Saturday, but no sale was made. It was bid up to \$17,500, which was deemed less than its value by the representatives of the Glintz estate.

Treating Smut in Oats. Farmers are beginning to look over oat bins with a view of selecting seed for the first crop to be sown next spring. Smut in oats causes one of the large annual losses. Treating the oats you have for smut may bring you better returns than investing in high priced, untried seed in your neighborhood. Smut is easily and cheaply controlled by treating the seed with formaldehyde, applied as a spray, sprinkle or dip. Whatever method is used, one pint of formaldehyde properly diluted will treat 50 bushels of oats. Seed should be cleaned thoroughly and graded before it is treated. Surplus seed treated with formaldehyde may be fed to livestock without injury, provided the grain is first spread out and thoroughly aired for several days. If bags and sacks have been used for smutty oats, they should be soaked in a formaldehyde solution or sprayed with it before treated seed is put in them. Contaminated drills also should be disinfected. Formaldehyde is irritating to the eyes, nose and throat and must be handled with care.

DEATHS.

GREENHOE.—Mrs. Greenhoe, wife of Rev. Samuel F. Greenhoe, died at the Lutheran parsonage here, Saturday morning from carcinoma of the liver, after an illness of several weeks during which time she had been treated by specialists. She had been suffering to some extent from the disease for a number of years.

Puneral services were held on Tuesday afternoon in the Lutheran church, Dr. Wagner, of Hazelton, president of Central Pennsylvania Synod, and Dr. W. M. Rearick, of Millburg, secretary of the same body, officiating. Interment was made in the local cemetery.

Sallie Minerva Greenhoe was the daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth (Noel) Rishel, and was born in Buffalo Valley, Union county. She is survived by her husband, Rev. Greenhoe, pastor of the Penna Valley Lutheran church, and one sister, Mrs. Howard E. Butz, of Huntingdon; also, a half-sister, Mrs. Curtis Kelly, of Lewisburg, and a niece, Mrs. N. P. Grayson, of Shippensburg. She was aged 65 years, 3 months and 7 days.

Mrs. Greenhoe took a lively interest in the pastoral work of her husband, and was identified with the activities in the congregation here, and interested in the welfare of the Church at large.

THOMPSON.—James Irvin Thompson was found dead in bed on Sunday morning, at his home near State College. The body was shipped to Pittsburgh for cremation. The ashes, when returned, will be interred in the Pine Hill cemetery. He would have attained his 74th year August 3rd.

Mr. Thompson was the last survivor of the Moses Thompson family. Three daughters survive the deceased: Mrs. Charles Thomas, Stahl, Mich.; Misses Hilda P. and Alice L., at home.

He died there three hours after being admitted. Mr. Sheckler was 69 years of age.
