COURT NEWS.

Work House for not less than six months nor more than twenty.

The next case taken up was C. N. Fisher vs. A. L. Peters. Defendant appeared in open Court and confessed judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$325.00, and the record costs.

William R. Kerstetter and Mary L. Kerstetter, individually and Frederick Kerstetter by his natural guardian and next friend William R. Kerstetter and Mary L. Kerstetter vs. Verna Gehret. This case had been settled and a verdict was taken in favor of the defendant.

Comm. vs. Mike Mittal, indicted on a statutory charge. Prosecutrix, Anna Warholik. When the defendant was arraigned he plead guilty and also plead the statute of limitation, the indictment not having been found within a period of two years from the time of the alleged crime. On Tuesday morning the District Attorney moved the Court for a nol pros which was allowed.

Comm. vs. John Reed, charged with violation of the motor laws; prosecutrix, C. I. Gross, State Highway Patrolman. This prosecution grew out of an accident by the defendant's car colliding with a car belonging to Mr. Ulrich at Pleasant Gap, and it was discovered that the defendant was under the influence of liquor. The defendant entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$100.00 and to the county jail for a period of three months.

Comm. vs. Mike Mittal, indicted for wantonly or playfully handling firearms; prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. The prosecutrix, with other officers, went to Taylor township to serve a search warrant and defendant pointed a revolver at two of the officers, after night. The defendant fought strenuously that the men had no right to enter his home and castle and it was not proven that he knew who the parties were. The jury rendered a verdict on Tuesday afternoon of not guilty and put the costs on the county.

Comm. vs. Donald Davis, indicted for enticing a female child for immoral purposes; prosecutrix, Leo Boden, county detective. This prosecution was brought after an investigation of one Caroline Downing. This case was finished on Tuesday before the adjournment of court and the verdict rendered Wednesday morning.

On Monday morning before court convened the Court went over the list of civil cases to be tried next week and the following cases were disposed of: Ralph Smith vs. J. Clyde Thomas, Raymond S. Howard and Martin Dunlap, being an action in ejectment; continued. Sadie W. Schaeffer and H. P. Schaeffer, her husband, vs. the borough of Bellefonte, being an action in trespass; continued. C. E. Knisley vs. Roy Wilkinson, guardian ad litem of Ross Griffin, being an action in trespass; continued.

Comm. vs. William Swanser, charged with violation of the liquor laws. The defendant came into court on Monday morning and plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$250.00, and undergo probation for a period of three years.

Comm. vs. Thomas Shay, indicted for a statutory offense; prosecutrix, Elizabeth Horan. Verdict on Monday afternoon of guilty and the usual sentence in such cases was imposed.

Comm. vs. Clarence Benner, indicted for seduction; prosecutrix, J. F. Krumpke for and in behalf of his daughter Esther. The case went to trial and resulted in a verdict of guilty.

Comm. vs. Rosa Ward, indicted for malicious mischief. Prosecutrix, Emma Nelson. The case was tried without a jury and resulted in the defendant being convicted by the court and sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo a probation for a period of one year.

Millfinburg Man Hangs Himself.

The body of Clarence Spigelmeyer was found Saturday morning hanging in a pig pen at the rear of his home, in Millfinburg, by Donald Weiser. Mr. Weiser cut the rope attached to a raft-er, with a knife which he found in the dead man's pocket.

Mr. Spigelmeyer had been in ill health for several years, and it is believed that despondency over his condition caused him to take his own life. About two years ago when his barn and stock were destroyed by fire, Mr. Spigelmeyer was badly burned.
