Outlook figures released by federal agricultural officials indicate that farmers in the United States intended to plant 3,570,000 acres of potatoes this year compared with 3,370,000 acres harvested last year. Yields in line with the trend of recent years will provide a crop too large for consumption needs and, therefore, profitable produc-

For best results do not start to save eggs for hatching purposes for the first ten days or two weeks after the male birds have been allowed to run with the breeders.


Rotate Farm Crops-
