## Produce the Best-

In planning the year's operations on the farm, it is a good idea to consider the opportunities for marketing high quality products. Gaining a reputation for producing the best brings established customers who will be loath to change to an uncertain supply.

Improve Home Grounds-

Old lawns should be gone over carefully at this time. Unsightly depressions which cannot be removed by rolling can be eliminated by lifting the sod, filling with good soil, and replacing the sod. Where this is impractic able, fine loam can be spread over the lawn to a depth of three inches. The existing grass will force its way through the new soil.
