Attorney W. D. Zerby died Wednesday morning at his home on East Linn street, Bellefonte. He was aged 54 years. At the time of this writing no arrangements had been made for the funeral.

HAUGH.—Mrs. Rosa Haugh, wife of the late John Haugh, of State College, died Friday of last week at her home in State College. Her husband preceded her in death April 25th of last year.

Mrs. Haugh was a daughter of Solomon and Barbara Rowland. She was born near Newton Hamilton, July 26, 1853, making her age at death 76 years, 7 months and 11 days. Her early life was spent in the counties of Huntington, and Mifflin. Three children survive: Mrs. (Rev.) J. M. Kiskadee, Centre Hall; Thomas and Hubert Haugh, of State College; also three grandchildren, as well as two brothers—Harry B. Rowland, of Spokane, Wash., and Charles B. Rowland, of Chicago, Ill.

H. B. Rowland had been spending the last year with his sister at State College. Mrs. Haugh, while not really ill had been falling rapidly during the past year.

Mrs. Haugh had the honor of holding a certificate of life membership in the Foreign Missionary Society of the United Brethren Church.

She was a member of the W. C. T. U. and of the United Brethren Church since her girlhood.

On June 20, 1882, she was married to John Haugh, of Murkirk, Scotland.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. E. C. Paul, of St. Paul's M. E. church of State College. He was assisted by Rev. Witman, student pastor of the same church. Mrs. Wilbur Litzel and Mrs. Lynn Daugherty sang two beautiful selections.

Interment was made at Pine Hill cemetery on Sunday.

STUART.—Mrs. Ellen M. Stuart, one of the best known women in State College, passed away Thursday morning of last week at her home on Pugh street, after a illness of upwards of six months.

Mrs. Stuart was born at Boalsburg, and was the daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth Moser. She was aged 79 years and 7 months. She was united in marriage to John W. Stuart, who was also one of that town's foremost citizens, having served as the second president of the First National Bank, president of the State College Water Company, and as postmaster. Mrs. Stuart died December 21, 1911, but the deceased is survived by two daughters, Mrs. H. B. Shattuck and Mrs. R. D. Gilliland, as well as a brother and a sister, John Moser, of Wilkes-Barre, and Mrs. Elizabeth Jacobs, of Centre Hall. She had long been an active member of the Presbyterian church and of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Funeral services were held at her late home on Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock, her pastor, Dr. Samuel Martin officiating. Interment was made in the Branch cemetery.

COURT NEWS.

(Reported by S. D. Gettig, Esq.) M. H. Van Zandt vs. Harry Behrer, William Breon, John F. Spencer, Harry Tressler and I. C. Holmes, being an action in trespass. This case was called late Monday afternoon and a jury challenged, but no testimony was taken until Tuesday morning and lasted nearly all day and the case grows out of an arrest of the plaintiff for selling diseased meat not fit for human consumption, but plaintiff was discharged by the Justice of the Peace. This action was brought by the plaintiff to recover damages for an illegal arrest. At the close of the plaintiff's testimony on Tuesday afternoon counsel for defendants moved a compulsory non suit which was granted by the Court. The Federal Land Bank of Baltimore, Maryland, vs. the Estate of Mollie E. Confer, Frank Cox, Milford Cox, Ruth Cox, nee Gilbert, and Charlotte Confer, heirs of Mollie E. Confer and the estate of John G. Confer, Arthur C. Dale, executor of John G. Confer. Being an action to foreclose a mortgage. The case was called late Tuesday afternoon and a verdict rendered in favor of the plaintiff for \$2983.91, debt and interest, insurance paid \$18.60, and an attorney's commission of \$91.60. At the conclusion of the last case Court adjourned until Saturday next.
