SUGAR VALLEY SITE IS CONSIDERED BY U. S.

Three Sites Near Watsontown Are Offered as Suitable Locations for Federal Prison to Be Located in Pennsylvania.

Three sites not far from Watsontown are offered as suitable locations for the new prison to be established by the United States, and which it has been determined will be located in Pennsylvania.

One of the sites is on the White Deer Pike Sugar Valley, westward from the Watsontown bridge, where land holdings with timber, stone and water are located.

Another is near Tea Springs, where three counties, Lycoming, Union and Clinton join. The third is still farther west, in Clinton county, on one of the oldest highways in Pennsylvania. This site contains unlimited facilities for building.

Bellefonte Woman Badly Injured by Automobile.

When she was struck by a car while on her way home, in Bellefonte, from church, Sunday evening, Mrs. Thomas Shaughtensay, of East Howard street, was severely injured. She was crossing the street at the corner of Bishop and Allegheny streets, when the car driven by Earl M. Houck, of East High street, came around the corner and ran into her.

Mrs. Houck picked the injured woman up and took her to the Centre County hospital where it was found she had suffered an injury to the left arm, a fracture of the left wrist, and injuries to the right ankle, and the head and chest. She also suffered numerous body bruises.

DEATHS

LOUGHNER.—Edward Henry Loughner passed away Monday forenoon after an illness of several months from organic heart disease, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. Elmer Noll, in Centre Hall, aged 64 years, 4 months and 9 days. Mr. Loughner became ill at his hunting camp, east of Sunset club house in Seven Mountains, where he and the Loughner family were living, and was brought to the home of his daughter the latter part of January. Improvement at times was only temporary, the end coming at the time noted.

The body was prepared for burial and Wednesday afternoon was taken to Bellefonte for shipment to Jeannette where interment will be made today (Thursday). The deceased was a native of Jeannette where he lived until about sixteen years ago when he removed to Potters Mills and later purchased the Bible farm near there and greatly improved it. He was a carpenter and contractor, but tired of life in populous sections. He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Miss Isabel Findley; also by four children: Ethel, Mrs. J. Elmer Noll, of Centre Hall; Gertrude, Mrs. Hoover V. Noll, Pleasant Gap; Edward and Donald, at home A brother, D. Elmer Loughner of Conneltsville also survives him.

BURD.—Carrie Naomi, wife of Sumner Burd, died from tuberculosis at her home in Aaronsburg on Monday morning. Funeral services were held on Wednesday forenoon; interment at Aaronsburg.

The deceased was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Rossman, both deceased. She is survived by her husband and five children. Her age was 50 years, 3 months and 22 days.

ZERBY.—John Henry Zerby passed away on Tuesday at his home east of Spring Mills, where he had lived and engaged as a laborer. He was aged 64 years, 3 months and 1 day. He was a widower, but was survived by three sons.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon, with interment in the Paradise church cemetery.

Funeral services were held from his late home, with the Rev. John F. Harkins officiating. Interment was made in the Shiloh cemetery.

ZERBY.—Though not entirely unexpected the passing of William Daup Zerby, Esq., at his home on east Linn Street, Bellefonte, at 10:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning of last week, was a distinct shock to his friends in Bellefonte and throughout the county. He had not been in good health for a year or more but had been up and around until three weeks ago. A combination of heart and lung trouble caused his death.

He was a son of Philip and Elizabeth Daup Zerby and was born in Penn township, September 24th, 1856, hence was in his 54th year. He was educated in the public schools of his home locality, then took a course in Bucknell University. Following his graduation he went to Bellefonte and read law in the office of Orvis & Bower, being admitted to practice at the Centre county bar twenty-seven years ago.

After his admission to the bar he became a member of the law firm of Orvis, Bower & Zerby, and some years ago when that legal firm was dissolved he continued his association with former Judge Ellis L. Orvis under the firm name of Orvis & Zerby.

In 1907 he married Miss Isabelle Taylor, who survives with two children, Miss Elizabeth and William, both at home. He also leaves one brother and a sister, Emory Zerby and Mrs. Faust, both of Elgin, Ill.

A meeting of the Centre county bar was held at 1:30 on Saturday afternoon and immediately thereafter members of the bar went in a body to the Zerby home, on east Linn street, where funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock by Rev. Stuart Gast, rector of St. John's Episcopal church, of which he was a member; interment was made in the Union cemetery.

CENTRE COUNTYAN MORTALLY WOUNDED IN FLORIDA

Bandit Holds Up George Kuhn, Formerly of Benner Township.—Son Also Shot in Hip, But Will Recover.—Two Others in Filling Station Escape Without Injury.

George Kuhn was mortally wounded by a bandit on Thursday night of last week at his filling station at Holy Hill, near Daytona Beach, Florida. Death followed Saturday night. The dead man's son, Andrew Kuhn, was shot in the hip by the same bandits, and although the wound is a painful one he is expected to recover.

George Kuhn is a son of Andrew Kuhn, deceased, and was reared in the section in Benner township, Centre county, known as "Rock." He was aged about forty-two years. Mr. Kuhn conducted a filling station, and while in the office the bandits entered and made demands for money. Mr. Kuhn and a son, Andrew Kuhn, aged 21 years, refused to comply with the demands made, whereupon the bandit shot both of them. The wound on the elder Kuhn proved fatal, as noted above.

In the filling station was a third Centre countyan—Ernest Kuhn—and another man known by the Kuhn's. Ernest Kuhn formerly lived with Mr. and Mrs. D. F. Smith, of Centre Hall, when they lived on a farm east of town. He was employed at the filling station and was related to the owner. He and the fourth man in the office escaped while the parley was in progress.

Mr. Kuhn is survived by a wife (Sarah Burris), a sister of Mrs. Jewett Brooks and Harry Burris, both of near here, and three children. A fourth child was taken into the home and reared. Clement Kuhn, of State College, is a brother. D. F. Smith, of town, is an uncle of Mr. Kuhn. Funeral services were held on Sunday.

One of more of the bandits were captured at Jacksonville, Florida, but nothing further is known here.
