STATE COLLEGE MAN DROPS DEAD ON STREETS

Philip D. Foster, Fire Chief and Former Post Master of Borough, Suffers Heart Attack, Dying on Street Near Home While on Way to Fire.

Philip D. Foster, aged 65 years, a prominent citizen of State College, died very suddenly just before noon, Friday. He was on his way to a fire in the new engineering building near his home when he dropped dead on the street from a heart attack.

Mr. Foster at the time of his death was a candidate for the office of county chairman on the Republican ticket.

Mr. Foster served as treasurer of Centre county for four years and was postmaster at State College for four years. At the time of his death he was employed by the State in the Workmen's Compensation Insurance Department, at Harrisburg. He was one of the organizers of the State College Fire company and had been its chief for many years.

Funeral services were held Monday. He is survived by a wife, two sons and two daughters.

RACHAU.—As the result of an illness from pericarditis, John Wellington Rachau died at his home in Gregg township, in upper Brush Valley, on Saturday morning. Interment was made on Wednesday forenoon, in the Union cemetery, Farmers Mills after appropriate services.

The deceased was a farmer by occupation. He was born in Miles township and was a son of John and Elizabeth (Roush) Rachau, both deceased. He was aged 67 years, 11 months and 14 days.

He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Miss Mary Rote, and the following children:

Smeltzer, Green Springs, Ohio. William Rachau, a brother, living at Farmers Mills, died on February 24th.

SANDOE.—Although ill for some time from pneumonia, Mrs. William A. Sandoe died very unexpectedly on Sunday afternoon. The announcement here was made by telephone to the Bartholomew family. She had been critically ill and had had the attention of both a day and a night nurse at her home, but her condition had so much improved that the night nurse was dispensed with and the family was altogether hopeful of her recovery. Funeral services were held yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon. Interment was made at Ingram, where the family moved from here the latter part of 1905. Mr. Sandoe died about ten years ago and was buried at Ingram.

The deceased's maiden name was Miss Jennie Riley. She was reared in Boalsburg. The family located in Centre Hall during the early eighties. There survive her two children—William A. Sandoe, Jr., of Philadelphia, and Helen, wife of Jack Fox; also a granddaughter, who was with her grandma during the last hours of her life. Mrs. Sandoe was active in church work while in Centre Hall and continued her activities in that line at Ingram.

HAUGH.—Mrs. Della Halsh passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Herbert Smull, in Rebersburg, on Tuesday evening of last week. She had been sick for two weeks previous, but had been improving. On the day of her death she had gone upstairs in the late afternoon to rest, and later was found by her daughter, dead.

She was aged 69 years. She was twice married, both husbands having preceded her to the beyond. Two children remain to the first union. There also remain the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Andrew Brumart, Mrs. Clayton Brumart, both of Rebersburg; Mrs. Newton Weber and George Crouse of Smilton; and Sallie, some where in the West.

Interment was made at Rebersburg on Saturday afternoon, the Methodist minister there having charge of the funeral services.

FLEISHER.—Wilbur Harry Fleisher, aged 29 years, 2 months and 29 days, a former Lewisburg resident, died at the St. Joseph Hospital, Parkersburg, West Va., Monday afternoon of last week. His death was caused by an attack of pneumonia of one week's duration. His residence was in Parkersburg. Previously Mr. Fleisher was employed four years in the Viceplant, Lewisburg, in the main office and with the electricians and pipe fitters.

Mr. Fleisher leaves his wife whose maiden name was Miss Rella May Hartsock, of Burnham, and the following four brothers and two sisters; Norman T. and Harold B. Fleisher, and Miss Lillian Fleisher at their parental home; George J. Fleisher, 224 Valley St., Lewisburg; J. William Fleisher, Indiana county, and Mrs. Clyde Wertz, of McClure. He was a grandson of Thomas Fleisher, of Pottery Mills.

WINEGARDNER.—After an illness of six weeks from broncho-pneumonia, William Russler Winegardner passed out of this life at his home at Milroy, Wednesday afternoon of last week. For Republican County Chairman.

Formal announcement appears in another column of this paper of the candidacy of Register of Wills Harry A. Rossman for election as Republican County Chairman at the primaries on May 20. Mr. Rossman was a friend and supporter of the late Phil Foster, of State College, and when the latter died suddenly last Friday, responded to the appeal of a representative group of Republicans to enter the field for the chairmanship. He has informed his friends that he will wage an active canvass and that he is confident he will be elected. His qualifications for the chairmanship are, in his opinion, coupled with a sincere desire and determination to strengthen the party in Centre county in every way possible.

Mr. Rossman's popularity throughout Centre county was demonstrated by the record-breaking majorities he received when he was a candidate for Register of Wills. He was born at Pleasant Gap, May 15, 1885. He attended Susquehanna University two years and then graduated at Williamsport Commercial College. For some years he taught in the public schools in Centre county, subsequently organizing and becoming secretary and treasurer of the Oak Hall Lime and Stone Co., eventually disposing of his interests in the company and becoming a teacher in Spring township. His boyhood was spent in Ferguson township where he attended the district school and finally graduated at the Ferguson Township High School in 1906.

Always active in community and county affairs, Mr. Rossman is a member of Bellefonte Lodge 268 Free and Accepted Masons, Williamsport Consistory, member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows; member of the Knights of the Golden Eagle; also of the Modern Woodmen of America; has been commander of the Patriotic Order Sons of America; member of the Kiwanis Club of Bellefonte; is president of the Centre County Automobile Dealers' Association. In religious affairs Mr. Rossman is affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal church. On November 21, 1911, Mr. Rossman married Verna Belle Stevenson, of Hubert, Pa. They have four children. In recent years the Rossman family have resided at Milesburg.
