STATE COLLEGE MAN DROPS DEAD ON STREETS

Philip D. Foster, Fire Chief and Former Post Master of Borough, Suffers Heart Attack, Dying on Street Near Home While on Way to Fire.

Philip D Foster, aged 65 years, a prominent ditizen of State College, died very suddenly just before noon, Friday. He was on his way to a fire in the new engineering building near his home when he dropped dead on the street from a heart attack.

Mr. Foster at the time of his death vas a candidate for the office of couny chairman on the Republican ticket. Mr. Foster served as treasurer of Centre county for four years and was postmaster at State College for four rears. At the time of his death he was employed by the State in the Workman's Compensation Insurance Department, at Harrisburg.
