The rumor that fishing licenses are costing \$2.00 instead of \$1.50 is believed to be responsible for only about one-half the normal number of licenses having been sold up to this time. DEATHS

Dr. Edwin M. Miller. Dr. Edwin M. Miller, Millheim physician, died at his home on West Main street, at five o'clock Monday morning after an illness of less than a day, having suffered a heart attack about 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. It is said that he suffered a slight attack on Saturday evening on the street, but it passed quickly and no ill effects were noted.

As a matter of fact, the doctor had been more than ordinarily active during the past several months, and while no fatigue could be seen in his spry step or cheerful manner during the course of his labors among the community's ill, the strain of the extra work is probably the direct cause of the fatal attack.

Edwin Melancthen Miller was a son of the late John A. and Mary C. (Esterline) Miller, and was born in Robersburg June 21, 1867, making his age 62 years, 9 months and 23 days. He received his early education in the public schools of Robersburg. He later graduated from Susquehanna University with an A. M. degree. Continuing his educational pursuits, he entered Jefferson Medical College at Philadelphia from which institution he graduated in 1890 with the degree of Doctor of Medicine. About eight years ago he took special work at this medical school in order to be more fully equipped to meet the demands upon the country practitioner.

His first year of practice was gained in Millheim, in association with Dr. G. S. Frank, at Millheim. This was followed by two years at Trexville, and 31 years at Beavertown. Six years ago he returned to Millheim, where he had since been located.

In a professional way the doctor was associated in membership with the American Medical association, the Pennsylvania Medical society and the Centre County Medical society. He was a member of St. John's Lutheran church in Millheim; he was a 32nd degree Mason, with membership in the F. and A. M. lodge at Middleburg, Harrisburg Consistory and Jaffa Shrine at Altoona.

He was twice married. The first wife, who was Miss Regie Swartz, died 34 years ago. A son, J. Randall Miller, now of Millheim, was born to this union. He is also survived by his second wife, who was Miss Sarah Boush, and two sons of the second marriage, Stanley E., at home, and Ward C., a dental student at Temple University, Philadelphia, as well as two sisters—Mrs. G. G. Frank, of Millheim, and Mrs. Catherine Miller, of Harrisburg.

The suddenness with which the doctor is taken away is a distinct shock to the community, especially so since his professional services were available at any hour of the day or night. He carried into the sick-room all the dignity and confidence of his profession, about them were clothed in a never-failing good cheer. He was one of the community's representative and substantial citizens, always disposed toward civic improvement with hand and purse; a neighborly person and well-liked.

Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon at 2 o'clock, the body to be interred in Fairview cemetery, following which the obsequies will be continued with services in the Lutheran church, the Rev. Louis V. Leshar officiating.

RUNKLE—Mrs. Emma Runkle, wife of Dr. Stuart C. Runkle, of 238 South 35th Street, Philadelphia, passed away at her home on Wednesday of last week after an illness of but a week. She had been in rather delicate health for a year, and had suffered on several previous occasions from similar conditions to that of her last illness but had always recovered, and the family was hopeful to the last that she would again do so. Funeral services were held from the home on Saturday according to the rites of the Reformed church of which denomination she was a member. Interment was made in one of the city cemeteries.

The deceased was Miss Emma Campbell before marriage. She is survived by her husband and two sons: Rev. John Runkle, an Episcopal minister, of Long Island, and Stuart Runkle, a student in a medical college, Philadelphia, also a grandson. Two sisters also survive her.

Mrs. Runkle was known here to a number of persons whose acquaintance was formed on their frequent visits to the old home surroundings of Dr. Runkle. She was held in high esteem by all who knew her. She was actively engaged in various lines of work as long as her health permitted her to do so. In her home she was the idol of her children and husband.

LONG.—Mrs. Maurice Long, of Mattawana, Mifflin county, while on a visit to her sister, Mrs. John McMillan, in Baltimore, Md., fell dead while walking on the street. The body was brought to her home and interment was made in the Mattawana cemetery. The deceased was a sister of Mrs. Samuel Shoop, of town.

CRAMER.—Samuel Cramer passed away at his home at State College on Sunday morning, at the age of about 67 years. Death was due to conditions following a paralytic stroke a year ago. Interment was made in Myer's cemetery.

The deceased was a son of John Cramer and was born and reared in Ferguson township. Before moving to State College he lived on a farm at Oak Hall Station. He was twice married, first to Margaret J. Koch, and later to Bertha Gingerich. The latter wife survives him. There were no children.

THOMPSON.—William M. Thompson died in Los Angeles, California, aged 76 years. He was born in Lock Haven, and went to the Pacific coast from Milroy, to which place the family moved. He was engaged in the real estate business. Edward B. Thompson, of Pittsburgh, who is an occasional visitor in Centre Hall, is an only surviving brother. A wife and these children survive him: Wallace Thompson, Millheim; Henry Thompson, Burnham; Mrs. Charles Steward, Milroy; and Mrs. F. G. Andre, Burlington, Michigan.

WILKINSON.—Mrs. Emily Granger Wilkinson, mother of County Probation and Parole Officer Roy Wilkinson, of

Belleville, died at her son's home in Belleville, following an illness of paralysis, aged 76 years. She was born at Philadelphia and was a daughter of Robert and Annie Granger. She was married in April, 1876, but her husband died a number of years ago. Only one son survives, along with one sister, Mrs. Josephine Durham, of Bryn Mawr. Funeral services were held at the Willinson home on Thursday by Rev. Stuart Gast; interment in Philadelphia.

DELONG.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Delong, aged 78 years, died at her home in Loganton, following an illness of several weeks. She was a life-long resident of Loganton, and a member of the Silverleaf Reformed lodge.

She is survived by two sons and a daughter: J. E. Hockman, of Russellton; Harry, of Cleveland, O.; and Mrs. A. J. Logan, of Meadville. One sister, Mrs. Effa Whitley, of Philadelphia, also survives. Interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery at Loganton.

Watch Results of Deer Experiments.

Game Commission officials are following closely experiments being made at State College with a herd of 21 deer. The experiments are to determine the effect of various kinds of natural forage when fed to the deer for long periods.

For the past five weeks the deer have been fed nothing but laurel and rhododendron. Although the deer show marked signs of malnutrition the supposedly poison diet has had no other effect.

County Superintendents of Schools Elected in Nearby Counties.

Superintendents of public schools elected in nearby counties are noted below: Guy C. Brosius, of Lock Haven, for the past seven years superintendent of the Clinton county public schools, was re-elected for a term of four years at a meeting of the school directors of the county, held in the court house Tuesday of last week.

Lawrence T. Orner, supervising principal of Nicholson, Wyoming county, and a former resident of Bald Eagle township, was also a nominee. The vote resulted in 80 for Mr. Brosius and 17 for Mr. Orner. The salary was fixed at \$4,500, an increase of \$500 over the preceding term. Mr. Brosius is allowed \$500 traveling expenses by the State department.

George L. Swank, of Sunbury, was re-elected superintendent of the Northumberland county schools. His salary was fixed at \$4,000 year. The present assistant superintendents are John B. Boyer and Charles Hillis. No change is expected.

Fred W. Diehl, of Danville, was re-elected superintendent of the Montour county schools, by the directors of the county. He has held the office twelve years.

By a unanimous vote of the school

directors, Wm. W. Evans was re-elected superintendent of the schools of Columbia county. His salary was fixed at \$4,500, an increase of 500 per year. His assistant will again be Miss Ida Walters, and her salary will be increased to \$3,000 per year.

Frank P. Boyer, superintendent of the Mifflinburg schools, was elected county superintendent of schools in Union county by a vote of 29 to 23; he was opposed by Emory O. Bickel, of Mifflinburg, the present incumbent in office. The position pays a salary of \$3,000, with \$500 allowed for expenses.

E. B. Sipe, principal of the Burnham public schools, has been elected superintendent of Mifflin county schools at a salary of \$3500 a year. Lawrence Tuttle is the retiring superintendent.

Dr. J. W. Sweeney, of St. Mary's, who has served as county superintendent of schools of Elk county for the past thirty-four years, was unanimously re-elected. Dr. Sweeney's salary was increased \$1,000, making his annual stipend \$6,000. Because of the age limit Dr. Sweeney cannot be a candidate for re-election at the expiration of this term, but is eligible for pension.

George Horton, a West Penn Power employee, on Monday afternoon was seriously injured when an electric light pole on 25th street, Belleville, on which he was working, broke. Mr. Horton is about 35 years old, a resident of Ridgway, and belonged to a pruning crew.
