**FARM CALENDAR**

**TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE**

**Early Roosting Helps—**  
Checks should be encouraged to roost when four to six weeks old. Keeping checks from crowding on the floor and in the corners helps to prevent coccidiosis.

**Grow Root Vegetables—**  
The root crops, including beets, carrots, onions, turnips, salsify, parsnips and rutabagas, can be planted throughout the growing season to insure a plentiful supply for use then and a liberal quantity of many kinds of vegetables for storing or canning.

**Observe Egg Week—**  
For the fifth consecutive year the National Egg Week will be observed May 1 to 7. Poultrying now ranks as the sixth largest agricultural industry. Last year the value of poultry and eggs produced in the United States exceeded \$1,250,000,000.

**Protect Woolen Clothes—**  
Woolen garments should be cleaned and aired thoroughly before being stored for the summer. Garments free from moths can be kept safely in moth-tight containers. If there are moths in the garments, placing the clothing with flake naphthalene in air-tight containers will kill the larvae in about ten days.

**Shear, Clean, Dry Wool—**  
Wool should be shorn when the sheep are dry, and the floor should be clean. It is best to clean fleeces separately and then store the wools where it is dry. Most of the growers in the State use the wool pool for marketing their product.

**Use Rape Pasture—**  
Rape makes a good temporary pasture for finishing the market lamb. An acre requires only four to six pounds of seed and the pasture will carry 20 lambs for six weeks.
