DEATHS

World War Veteran Dead.

William Bilger died on Tuesday at
the U. S. Naval Hospital, League Is-
land near Philadelphia. The body will
be shipped to Bellefonte and from
there conveyed to the home of his pa-
rents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bilger, on
Nittany Mountain, by funeral director
Goodhart. The deceased was a World
War veteran and did service in France
and while so doing was gassed. He
was unmarried. Interment will be
made at Pleasant Gap.
The time of the funeral has not
been set at his writing.

DUBBS.—Mrs. Eliza Ulrich Dubbs,
widow of the late John G. Dubbs, died
at her home in Bush's Addition, Belle-
fonte, following six weeks' illness. She
was a native of Penns Valley where
she was born almost 86 years ago.
Most of her married life, however, was
spent in Bellefonte. Her husband died
in 1917 but surviving her are two chil-
dren, John F. Dubbs, of Bellefonte, and
Miss Grace, at home. Rev. Robert
Thena had charge of the funeral serv-
ices; burial was made in the Union
cemetery, Bellefonte, Friday.

BECK.—Mrs. Catherine J. Beck, wid-
ow of David J. Beck, died at the home
of her daughter, Mrs. Reuben Breon,
in Bellefonte, from a complication of
diseases, aged 88 years, 9 months and
27 days. The deceased was a daugh-
ter of John and Mary Painter and was
born in Penns Valley. The following
children, in addition to Mrs. Breon,
survive: William, of Williamsport; Mrs.
Charles Garbrick and Edward, of Belle-
fonte; Frank, of Ann Arbor, Mich. Fu-
neral services were held from the home
Rev. C. C. Shuey, officiating. Inter-
ment in the Jacksonsville cemetery.

CARIS.—Philip Caris died at his
home at Madisonburg, where he was
engaged in farming, early Tuesday
morning. Funeral services will be held
Friday forenoon and interment made
at Madisonburg.
The deceased was a son of Michael
and Catherine (Vonada) Caris. He
was aged 87 years and 29 days. His
wife survives him. Death was due to
heart trouble.

**Investigation to Be Made in Tragic
Death of Clintondale Youth.**

An investigation is being made by
County Coroner Dr. W. J. Shoemaker,
of Lock Haven, in the death of Donald
Baughman, 17-year-old youth, of Clin-
tondale, who died Sunday night at the
Lock Haven hospital of injuries re-
ceived in an accident on that morning
near Clintondale. An inquest was held
at the funeral parlors of C. L. Mc-
Closkey Wednesday morning.
The body was taken to the home of
the youth's mother, at Clintondale, on
Monday. Burial will be made today.

FARMERS BUY PUREBRED BULL.

The third Centre County Bull Asso-
ciation made up of eleven farmers liv-
ing near Centre Hall, purchased a
Holstein bull from Winterthur Farms,
near Wilmington. The animal comes
from a family of toppers in butter pro-
duction, and is of high quality from
individual points. He was selected by
Messrs. M. A. Burkholder, Paul Brad-
ford, Charles B. Smith and Charles
Rosen, four of the association members,
and R. C. Blaney, County Agent, who
visited the Winterthur Farm within
the past ten days. The other mem-
bers of the association not named
above are T. F. Delaney, M. C. De-
laney, John Delaney, Clarence Blazer,
Charles Foust, Willard Smith and Fern
Dunkle.

Each of these members has a fine
herd of Holstein cows, and are giving
them the best of attention. It will
require five or six years more to prove
the benefits of these bull associations.
Association No. 1 is in the vicinity of
State College and No. 2 about Belle-
fonte.

Greely Jordan Injured.

Greely Jordan, who is engaged as a
Potter township road man under his
brother, Wm. Jordan, a supervisor,
was seriously injured at the gravel pit
at Weaver's, near Colyer. Some of the
men had been working at the top of
the high breast of the gravel bank, and
on discontinuing doing so, notified
those below that tools would be drop-
ped. The men stood aside, but Mr.
Jordan misjudged and entered the path
of the last tool to be dropped. He was
struck on the head and knocked down
over a pile of gravel, inflicting addi-
tional injuries. He was rendered un-
conscious for a long while. His con-
dition at last reports was not so favor-
able.

The injured man was taken to the
home of his brother, Steward Jordan,
at Tusseyville, with whom he makes
his home.
