DOMESTIC RELATIONS COURT SESSIONS

Thursday and Friday Desertions and Non-Support Cases, Also Motor Code and Liquor Law Violations Heard—Motor Code Violators Get Jail Sentences.

Court convened on Thursday morning and held Domestic Relations Court, etc., on Thursday and Friday.

Comm. vs. Benjamin Harris; desertion and non-support; prosecutor, Carrie Harris. Defendant dismissed upon payment of costs.

Comm. vs. George F. Gehret; desertion and non-support of children. Sentenced to pay the costs and \$20 per month.

Comm. vs. Joseph Wade, Sr.; violation of motor code; prosecutor, C. H. Killian. Defendant discharged and the county to pay the costs.

Comm. vs. Maurice Larimer; violation of motor code; prosecutor, H. C. Pfaffel. Defendant discharged and county to pay the costs.

Comm. vs. Nery Weaver; prosecutor, Clara Weaver. For non-support of child. Defendant discharged upon payment of costs.

Comm. vs. J. J. Moore; violation of motor code; prosecutor, L. L. Webber. Passing through stop sign at Pleasant Gap. After hearing, case taken under advisement.

Comm. vs. Carl Strickland; violation of motor code; prosecutor, J. D. Russell. Sentenced to pay costs and undergo probation for period of one year.

Comm. vs. Clarence Bussard; violation of liquor laws. Prosecutor, Leo Boden. The defendant plead nolo contendere. Sentenced suspended upon payment of costs.

Comm. vs. Clarence Bussard; violation of motor laws; prosecutor, C. I. Gross. Sentenced to pay costs of prosecution and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for period of 10 days.

Comm. vs. Alton Heverly, Howard Miller, Mac Packer; charged with discharging fire property. Prosecutor, Orvis Fetzer. Defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay costs of prosecution, make restitution of damages and undergo probation of one year.

Comm. vs. Paul Rodgers, charged with desertion and non-support; prosecutor, June Gray Rodgers. Sentenced to pay costs of prosecution, license expenses and \$20 per month for two children.

Comm. vs. Landon Shreckengast, attempting to pass fraudulent checks; prosecutor, Samuel B. Condo. Defendant plead nolo contendere and sentenced to pay costs of prosecution and undergo probation for period of 2 years.

Comm. vs. Warren Van Tine; violation of motor code; prosecutor, L. L. Webber. Defendant discharged.

Comm. vs. Aden A. Garrett; charged with desertion and non-support. Prosecutor, Ida Garrett. Defendant discharged upon payment of costs.

Comm. vs. Victor Minarchek; violation of liquor laws; prosecutor, Leo Boden. Defendant to pay costs of prosecution, fine of \$50, and imprisonment of 60 days in county jail.

Comm. vs. Arthur Beach; violation of motor code; prosecutor, J. D. Russell. Defendant sentenced to pay costs of prosecution, fine of \$25, and serve ten days in county jail from the time of original commitment.

Comm. vs. Harry Horner, indicted for larceny; prosecutor, Forest L. Struble. Sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo probation for period of one year.

Comm. vs. Wm. Thompson, brought into court for violation of patrol on a former charge of forgery. Sentenced to pay fine of \$1.00, costs, and to the Allegheny County Work House for a period of not less than one year nor more than two years.

Comm. vs. Harvey McCool, charged with desertion and non-support; prosecutor, Isabel McCool. The original order made in this case was \$30.00 per month, and this order was increased to \$50.00 per month for the support of two children.

Comm. vs. Paul Rodgers; violation of motor code; sentenced to pay costs, fine of \$50.00 and imprisonment in county jail for period of three days, for passing through a red light.

Comm. vs. Willis Neff; violation of motor code; prosecutor, C. I. Gross. Defendant discharged.

Comm. vs. Wesley J. Blair, charged with desertion and non-support; prosecutor, Viola Blair. Defendant dismissed.

Comm. vs. Rankin McMonigal, charged with surety of the peace; prosecutor, Sam McMonigal. Defendant guilty and ordered to pay costs and enter into his own recognizance in the sum of \$300.00 to keep the peace.

Comm. vs. Wm. Reed, charged with desertion and non-support. Order heretofore made amended.

Comm. vs. John McCartney, charged with desertion and non-support. The defendant was released to go to work.

Comm. vs. Mike Kochonik, violation of motor code. Prosecutor, H. C. Pfaffel. Defendant sentenced to pay the costs, fine of \$25.00 and undergo probation for period of one year.

Comm. vs. Harold Moyer and Harry Stover; indicted for larceny. Prosecutor, Leo Boden. Defendants held until Monday when they were sentenced, as follows: Moyer, costs of prosecution, fine of \$1.00 and to the county jail for period of not less than six months nor more than three years. Stover, sentence suspended upon payment of costs.

Comm. vs. Andrew Belko, violation of liquor laws; prosecutor, Leo Boden. Defendant sentenced to pay costs and fine of \$300.00, and undergo probation for period of three years.

Court adjourned on Friday afternoon until Monday morning.

First case Monday morning, Comm. vs. Charles Spong; indicted for burglary. This case grows out of the breaking into the Elks' Club in Bellefonte in 1928 by this party and a man by the name of McCracken. McCracken plead guilty at a former court and was sentenced to the penitentiary. Spong went to trial but at the close of the Commonwealth's testimony the defendant changed his plea from that of not guilty to that of guilty, and was sentenced to pay the costs, fine of \$1.00, and to the penitentiary for not less than three years nor more than six years.

Comm. vs. Mike Billy; indicted for assault and battery; prosecutor, Leroy McClosky. Defendant plead guilty and was sentenced by the Court to pay the costs and a fine of \$25.00.

Comm. vs. Oscar F. Krape; indicted,

first count, burglary; second count, felonious assault. Prosecutor, F. Long, State Police. This case grows out of the entry of the home of Wm. F. Keszinger, near Eagleville Station, on the 11th day of Feb., 1930. At the close of the testimony the defendant changed his plea from not guilty to guilty, and on the first count was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, \$1.00 fine and to the penitentiary for not less than three years nor more than six years. The sentence on the second count was suspended.

DEATHS.

BRUNGART.—A more complete account than was given last week of the death of Ira Brungart, who died in Rebersburg, follows:

The deceased was born and reared in Miles township. He was a son of the late Jacob and Sarah (Orman) Brungart, and was born at Rebersburg, July 25, 1861. He was a direct descendant of the first Brungart families that settled in Brush valley and, for that matter, of the first Brungart to come to America, and was a member of the Pennsylvania Brungart Family association.

He was also a member of Rebersburg Lutheran church.

Mrs. Brungart was a farmer by occupation and enjoyed the friendship of his neighbors. Surviving are his wife, who was Ellen Snook, and four children: Mrs. Estella Witmer, of Bellefonte; Raymond J., of Detroit, Mich.; Edgar S. and Wilbur R., both of Rebersburg. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Miranda Wert, of Aaronsburg, and two brothers, Clayton J. and Jeremiah Brungart, of Rebersburg.

He was aged 68 years, 9 months and 18 days. Interment was made Saturday at Rebersburg.
