TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Feed Chicks Properly—In order to grow chicks well they must be supplied with an abundance of a suitable ration. At least one hopper four feet long is needed for 100 chicks. As they grow larger they will need more space.

Provide Winter Food—The home garden will provide for winter use a good supply of vegetables which can be canned, dried, stored, or cellar forced.

Mulch New Shrubs—Grass Cuttings or old leaves make an excellent mulch for newly planted shrubs and trees. The mulch conserves moisture and controls weed growth.

Keep Turkeys Healthy—The brooder house for turkeys should be moved away from other buildings to ground known to be free from contamination with chicken diseases.

Purebred Hogs Grow Best—Fifty-six per cent of the ton litters grown in Pennsylvania have been purebred and 94 per cent have been sired by purebred boars. In six years no scrub litters have reached the ton goal at six months of age.
