WET REPUBLICAN NATIONAL TICKET PREDICTED

F. Scott McBride, national superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, is among political observers who believe that the entrance of Ambassador Morrow into the political field as a candidate for senator from New Jersey on a wet platform, indicates that he is being groomed for the presidential nomination in 1932. It is believed that an element in the Republican party thinks a wet candidate should be put forward in the next campaign. Political observers in the future will be puzzled if they read some of the shifts of sentiment which politics have revealed in the prohibition era. Two years ago the Republican party proclaimed itself the dry party. Its retention in power was held to be essential to the enforcement of prohibition. Now it is suggested that two years hence it may try to come out wet.

SYNOD OFFICERS RE-ELECTED.

Report Shows \$1,067,448 Received for General Work.

All officers of West Pennsylvania synod of the United Lutheran Church in America were re-elected at the 196th annual session in St. Mark's Lutheran church, Hanover, they are:

President, the Rev. Dr. Henry Anstadt, Chambersburg; secretary, Rev. M. R. Hamsher, Mechanicsburg; treasurer, Rev. E. C. Ruby, of York, and statistical secretary, Rev. D. S. Martin, York.

Money received from the churches of the synod to carry on various departments of the organization amounted to \$1,067,448 for the past year, this being an increase of \$148,666 over the preceding year. The receipts for benevolences this year amounted to \$199,419. The synod received towards ministerial pension pledge this year \$191,060.23. The amount paid by West Pennsylvania synod towards the debt of the board of foreign missions of the Lutheran church was announced as \$7777.

The sessions were largely attended, 83 ministers out of a possible 96 and 63 delegates out of a possible 90 being present.

Rev. William A. Kimp, Chambersburg, executive secretary of the Lutheran College for Women, said that a sum of approximately \$1,600,000 would be necessary to found a college of the character contemplated.

An organized financial appeal is planned. A gift of \$25,000 toward the expenses of the campaign has been received from Mrs. Wm. T. Tonner, a member of the board of directors of the proposed school.

Eight synods of the Lutheran church have joined in the enterprise for establishment of the women's institution, which will be known as Grace College. Miss Jessie Truman, co-principal of Ellisdale School, Norwalk, Conn., has been elected dean. The college will be situated near Washington, D. C.

Lost Fire Fighter Returned.

Frank Wagner, who disappeared from Sigleville, when he entered the Seven Mountains, on May 5th, as a firefighter, returned a few days ago to the home of a relative.

A large sink hole in Treaster Valley was blasted several times in the hope that in this manner it might divulge the body of the missing man. And when that means failed, workmen drained the sink in the belief that the body was held to the bottom only to find their work useless.

When he came to the house of a relative, he had an armful of kindling wood. He said he had become frightened, hid among rocks and later took shelter in an abandoned stable. Some time before he became lost he suffered an injury, which apparently affected his mind. He subsisted, he said, during the fifteen days on tasteries while in the mountains, and later on any food he could find on the circuits he made from his hiding place.
