METING OF REFORMED CLASSIS.

The 74th annual meeting of West Susquehanna Classis of the Reformed Church was held from Monday to Wednesday of last week in St. John's church, Bellefonte. The opening sermon was preached by the retiring president, Rev. Delas R. Keener, Centre Hall. An address of welcome to the city was delivered by Rev. A. Ward Campbell of the Evangelical denomination representing the churches of Bellefonte.

The following officers were elected: President, Rev. Wm. S. Gerhard, Freeburg; vice-president, B. B. Huntington, West Milton; corresponding secretary, Rev. A. S. Asendorf, State College; reading clerk, Rev. Herbert Zechman, New Berlin; stated clerk, Rev. H. K. Rupp, Lewisburg; treasurer, David H. Keller, Centre Hall.

The preparatory sermon was preached by Rev. Wm. C. Rittenhouse, Williamsport; the morning devotional addresses were delivered by Rev. Irwin S. Ditzler, West Milton. On Tuesday evening Prof. N. Vin Harner of the Theological Seminary at Lancaster spoke on "The Challenge of Religious Education" before a large audience. A delightful reception was given to the members of the classis by the women of the church on Tuesday evening after the regular services. There was a short program of music and recitations and a number of short addresses by visiting ministers. A lunch was served.

Several noteworthy actions were taken. The classis favored the granting of full rights and privileges to the women of the church to hold places of office. Such action becomes effective only if two-thirds of the classis take similar action. It also expressed itself favorably to the efforts to union with the Evangelical Synod and the United Brethren Churches. The need to increase the benevolences of the church came in for special consideration. It was decided to hold an early meeting of classis in January; this will be held at West Milton, and a full meeting in October, at Lock Haven.

An elder's conference was held Wednesday. The classis honored by special recognition Rev. Frank Wetzel, of Akon, Ohio, now retired, a son of St. John's church, Bellefonte. He has completed fifty years in the ministry. Rev. W. A. McClellan of Rebersburg, retires from the ministry in June.
