DIES AT AGE OF 107 YEARS.

Mrs. Catherine English, Williamsport's Oldest Resident, Passes Away at Daughter's Home from General Collapse.

Mrs. Catherine English, aged 107 years, Williamsport's and perhaps Pennsylvania's oldest resident, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. L. Ritchey, Williamsport, a week ago.

Mrs. English is survived, besides her daughter, Mrs. Ritchey, by five sons; I. A. and E. H. English, of Williamsport; S. M. English, of Camden, N. J.; C. W. English, of Altoona, and J. L. English, of DuBois.

Mrs. English, who observed her 107th birthday in February, was born in a little log cabin at Kettle Creek, Clinton county, and spent most of her life at Hyner and Renovo. Until a few years ago she made periodic visits to her sons and other relatives.

Despite her advanced age, Mrs. English enjoyed long motor rides and on her hundredth anniversary motored to DuBois to attend a family reunion.

She had taken spending some time with a niece at Renovo until last fall when she made the trip to Williamsport by motor to remain with her daughter, Mrs. Ritchey. Her husband, Hezekiah English, died in 1909. She had very little illness in her long life and her mind was clear until her death, which came as a general collapse. On her 107th birthday, she had a large number of callers and there was a large dinner party in her honor. She was a Democrat all her life and cast her first vote in 1920.

Funeral services and interment took place at Renovo, her former home.

Death of Infant.

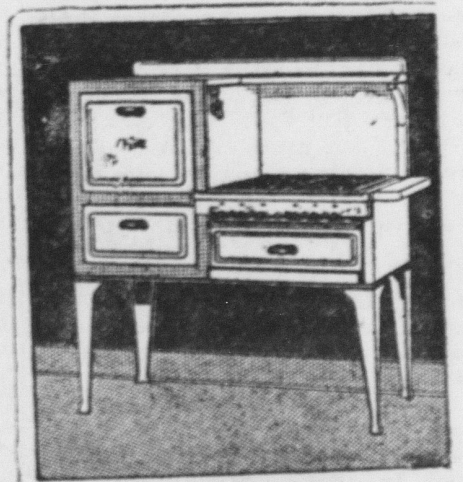

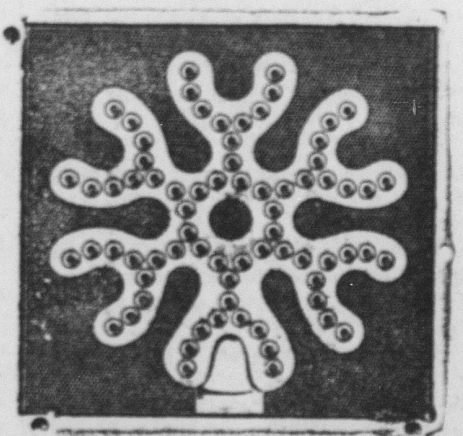

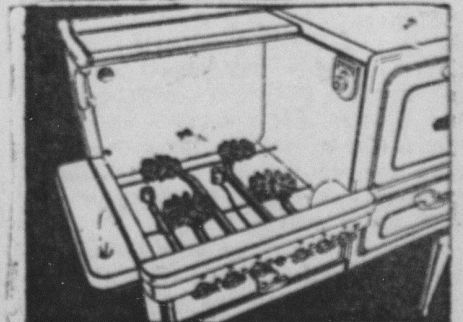
