Infant Mortality High in the "Good Old Days"

The mothers of Plus II and Dean Colet had each twenty-two children; in the one case only ten grew up, in the other only the dean. The parents of Philip Doddridge, the original author of the second "Paraphrase," had twenty children, but only Philip and a sister survived their infancy.

Thomas Gray, the poet, was the sole survivor of twelve. Of the fifteen children of the earl and countess of Bridgewater, famed in connection with Milton's "Comus," five died young. Of the twelve children of Richardson, the novelist, all died young except four. Three of Ebenezer Erskine's ten children died in two months, and later he lost his favorite daughter. Of the eleven children of Edmund and Catherine Nelson, parents of Lord Nelson, three died.

It thus appears that even in favorable circumstances children died at an alarming rate. The heavy mortality was not always due to poverty. Dean Colet's father was twice lord mayor of London, and quite able, therefore, to bring up a large family. In the case of Ebenezer Erskine's children, lack of proper sanitation was largely the cause.—Rev. William Watson in Chambers' Journal.

Jealous Man or Woman Lacks Self-Assurance

"There is, perhaps, no such thing as love without an occasional display of jealousy," says Burton Rascoe. "But in every case I believe it will be found that the one who is jealous has lost for the moment his or her self-assurance. It may be because of illness or overwork or a protracted lack of diversion.

"When I have been jealous or my wife has been jealous I have always noticed that our jealousy could be

traced to one of these three things. When I have been jealous, they have been occasions when I felt myself at a disadvantage, when my egoism was not topnotch.

"The man who knows that he depends upon his wife not to leave him in the lurch or desert him in a crisis or find some one else irresistibly more attractive, is pretty sure of himself, sure of his power to attract, sure of his worthiness as a man. This is true also of a woman."—Hearst's International-Cosmopolitan.

Law of Distance

The fact that smoke near a smoke stack appears to be dark and then grows lighter and lighter is a good illustration of the law of the inverse square of the distance. At one foot radius from the center of the stack, the surface exposed in any section is very small and the smoke particles very close together, and the passage of light through the particles is almost prevented. The smoke then appears black. At a two-foot radius the particles are twice as far apart and only one-quarter of the area is covered, allowing four times the light to pass through. This section is continuous, and more and more light passes through the smoke particles causing them to become of a much lighter color against the sky background. At some finite distance from the mouth of the stack, the separation has been so great that there is practically no more interference with the light and the smoke disappears.

Florida Homes Erigine

Blues, greens, browns, reds and purples—every hue of the rainbow—you see in the stucco houses and bungalows which have made Florida famous. The curious color effects are secured either by incorporating certain mortar colors in the plaster or by painting the surface of the stucco with large brushes and the desired pigment mixture when the surface has dried. Pink and Ivory with deep green trim are popular combinations, as are also mixtures of lavender, blue and mulberry with white trim. Pale green with polychrome is also a standard color combination. The majority of these stucco houses are built with red tile roofs.

Early Vice Presidents

John Adams, who received the second highest number of votes, became vice president in the first and second administrations of George Washington. In the same way Jefferson was elected vice president in 1799 when Adams was elected President, and Aaron Burr took second place in 1800 when Jefferson was elected President. By the twelfth amendment to the Constitution, effective September 25, 1804, the electors were instructed to ballot separately for President and vice president. George Clinton was the first man nominated and elected to the office of vice president, being elected in November, 1804, when Jefferson was re-elected President.

Bell System to Build 5,000 Miles of Cable

Approximately 5,000 miles of telephone cable for the transmission of toll, or out-of-town, telephone calls, are to be constructed this year by the Bell System. This amount is to be increased to between 6,000 and 7,000 miles for next year, and it is expected that the additions will continue at that rate or even higher for the next few years thereafter.

The estimated expenditure during 1929 for construction of additions to the existing toll cable network and other associated equipment was about \$100,000,000. The 1930 expenditure will be considerably greater.

The rapid increase in the volume of toll telephone traffic is attributed to the growing public appreciation of the extent to which the out-of-town service is of value in both business and social life and of the variety of uses to which it may be put.

1500-MILE CABLE

A 1500-mile telephone cable, extending from the Canadian border to the Mexican line, and passing through Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles, is being constructed by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company.

LOWER RATES TO MEXICO

Charges on all telephone calls between points in the United States and the principal Mexican cities have been reduced as the result of action on the part of the Mexican Telephone and Telegraph Company. This reduction follows three reductions on calls to Mexico made in the last three years by the Bell System.

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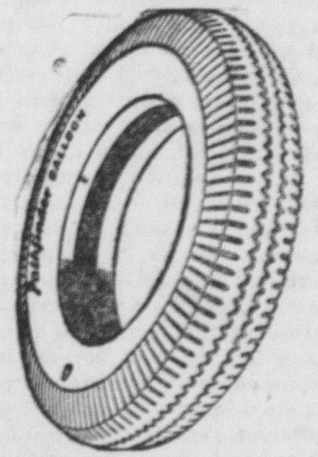
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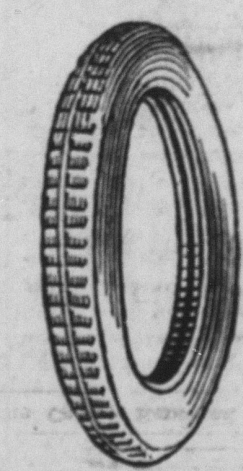
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
