ROY SCHAEFFER IN AUTO WRECK ON SATURDAY

Corporal Cecil I. They found that H. D. Kearns, of Altoona, operating a sedan on the wrong side of the road had collided with a sedan owned and operated by J. Roy Schaeffer, of Centre Hall.

The Altoona man was taken before Dr. John Sebring, Bellefonte, and pronounced intoxicated. A passenger by the name of J. R. Russell, riding with Kearns, was also under the influence of liquor. He became very loud and boisterous and was arrested on the charge of disorderly conduct.

A hearing was held Saturday evening at the office of Squire J. L. Tressel, and Russell pleaded guilty to his charge and was released after paying his fine and the costs. H. D. Kearns also pleaded guilty and was released after furnishing a bond of \$100 for the September term of court. The damage to Schaeffer's car amounted to \$75 and to Kearns' \$50. Mrs. Schaeffer received injuries to the left arm.

VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURAL PROJECT TOUR

Plans are just about completed for the first out-of-county project tour for the boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture in Centre county and their parents.

Last year the boys visited projects in Centre county, but this year they have asked to be taken to some other county to see the work being done there. With this in mind, a tour of six projects in Snyder county has been arranged.

The group will assemble at Spring Mills in time to leave there promptly at 8:00 A. M. Monday, August 11th. From Spring Mills the party will drive directly to Middleburg, Snyder county, and meet the group from that county. Several projects in and around Middleburg will be visited before lunch time. A basket lunch will then be served at a convenient place along the route. After lunch the party will move on to Beavertown where they will visit projects of the boys of the Beavertown Vocational school. After completing the project visits, the Centre county group will return home by way of Lewisport and Centre Hall.

It is hoped that a goodly number of boys and parents will take this opportunity of seeing the work of other boys in the vocational schools of Snyder county.

Invitations have been extended to the county superintendent of schools and his assistant; members of the State Department and the Department of Rural Education at the College; the County Agent and the teachers of Vocational Agriculture. A standing invitation is extended to any or all persons interested to go along on this tour.

The construction of .782 mile of bituminous surface treated macadam, 18 feet in width, on Traffic Route 879, Centre county, started this week. The contract will amount to \$22,316.69 and will be undertaken by J. L. Wilson, of State College. Centre county will pay 25 per cent, of the contract, the State paying the remainder. The project consists of an improvement of Traffic Route 879 leading northward from Moshannon towards Karthaus and Deftwood.
