keeper. On October 1st, 1930, when the Bellefonte Trust Co. assumes the trustee ship of the business operations of the McNitt Lumber Co. of Bellefonte, following a petition presented by three brothers and three siters of Andrew McNitt, the Bellefonte office of that company, located on Spring street, will cease to exist. Claims for Dog Damage Must Be Fair. Some local auditors and justices of the peace in Pennsylvania are apprais ing damages caused to livestock and poultry by dogs, in excess of the actual loss, according to the bureau of nimal Industry, Department of Agri-

Justices of the peace, aldermen magistrates and township auditors who are charged under the law to make such appraisals are representatives of the Commonwealth and as such, should see that the appraisals are made in accordance with the actual loss sustained and not be guided by what the person suffering the loss thinks, bureau officials assert. Animals should be appraised according to their worth at the time the damage was done and not their value a year or two ago or

some future value. The bureau explains that those who make unfair appraisals seriously in terfere with the prompt payment of all claims. The bureau will not tolerate the full payment of any claims which are clearly out of line with the

actual loss sustained. The bureau wishes and expects to make payment In every case to the full extent of the actual damage, but it can not be expected that a premi-um on such losses be paid. Continued disregard of this will lead to drastic regulations, officials asserted.
