### Put Late Chicks on Rango-

Late-hatched chicks should not be forgotten. It is worth while to place them on a separate range away from the older chicks.

Take Care of Helfers-

Take a look at the helfers out on pasture. They may be short of water or feed or both. It pays to keep the young stock growing. When to Requeen-

Requeening should be done toward the end of the last honey flow of the season. The operation preferably should be performed before the middle of September. New queens may be reared by the beekeeper or purchased from a reliable breeder.

### Show Farm Products-

### Clean the Sprayer-


