FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Put Late Chicks on Range—Late-hatched chicks should not be forgotten. It is worth while to place them on a separate range away from the older chicks.

Take Care of Heifers—Take a look at the heifers out on pasture. They may be short of water or feed or both. It pays to keep the young stock growing.

When to Requeen—Requeening should be done toward the end of the last honey flow of the season. The operation preferably should be performed before the middle of September. New queens may be reared by the beekeeper or purchased from a reliable breeder.

Show Farm Products—Every farmer has a chance to win some of the prize money offered by his county fair, county farm show, or State farm products show. Better specimens kept at home never win from those not quite so good which are entered in the competition.

Clean the Sprayer—Before putting the orchard or potato machine away for the season, it is a good plan to clean the tank and the working parts, oil the pump, and oil and loosen all threaded parts.

DEATHS

WEAVER—After a short illness, during which time he was confined to bed, Elias Weaver, of Spring Mills, passed away on Thursday morning at his home. Funeral services were held from the home on Monday forenoon; interment in Salem church cemetery, below Penn Hall. Rev. D. R. Keener, pastor of the Reformed church, officiated.

The deceased was a son of Simon Weaver, and at death was aged 78 years, 11 months and 3 days. His wife, who before marriage was Miss Double Grenoble, died almost ten years ago. There survive him a daughter, Emma, wife of William Ripka, near Spring Mills.

He was a farmer by occupation, and for many years lived on the farm he owned west of Spring Mills. On retiring from farming, about fifteen years ago, he moved to Spring Mills. Two years ago he suffered a paralytic stroke, the effects of which he never fully recovered.

KOCH—Mrs. Harriet Catharine Koch, widow of the late Amos Koch, died at her home in Aaronsburg on Tuesday morning, while seated in her easy chair. Death was due largely to her advanced age, which was 89 years, 7 months and 17 days. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon, with interment at Aaronsburg, where her husband was laid to rest about ten years ago.

The deceased was a daughter of Daniel and Sarah (Lutz) Condo. The Koch family lived in Centre Hall a number of years ago. Koch, State College; Mrs. Roy Coxey, Bellefonte; Franklin, at home.

ROBB.—Dr. George D. Robb, a native of Centre county, for 37 years principal of the Altoona High school and widely recognized as one of the leading educators in the State, died at his home in Altoona.

He was a son of Peter and Anna Mary Gath Robb and was born on a farm near Howard, on June 16th, 1866, hence was past 64 years of age.

In 1897 Dr. Robb married Miss Cora May Kline, of Howard, who survives with one son, Eugene W. K. Robb, supervising principal of the schools at Bedford. He was the last of his generation, three brothers and a sister preceding him to the grave.

The funeral was held on Saturday morning at the residence and was strictly private. Interment in the family burial plot at Howard, Saturday afternoon, and was likewise strictly private.

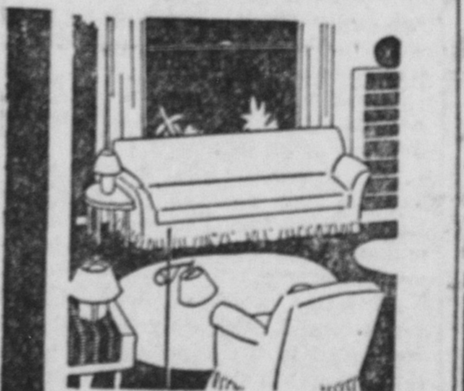
