LATROBE HUNTERS GET DECKER PROPERTY

In the case of the Latrobe Hunting and Fishing club against the administrators of the late John D. Decker, Judge Fleming handed down a decree ordering the administrators to deliver a deed to the club members, for the consideration of \$5750, or thereabouts.
