PARK.—The following is from the Nashville N. C. Times, 10th Inst.:

Mrs. Helen Elizabeth Park, 78 years old, of 26 Forest Hill road, Kemfworth, died Wednesday morning at Hillcrest. Manor of shock as a result of an automobile accident in which she sustained minor injuries August 23.

Mrs. Park lived here with her son, Dr. William E. Park, one of the staff physicians at United States Veterans Hospital No. 60, at Oteen. She was riding with her son at the time the accident occurred.

The two were driving down Coxie avenue, Dr. Park, who was driving, started to enter Southside avenue and stopped at the boulevard sign. He entered the street and was about to cross when he saw a speeding car approaching. He stopped in the middle of the street, he said, because he could not tell which way the approaching car was going to turn.

It hit the car in which Dr. Park and his mother were seated and turned it completely over. The car that hit Dr. Park's car was driven by Henry McMichael, negro, McMichael has been under \$1,500 bond pending outcome of Mrs. Park's injuries.

Mrs. Park sustained bruises and cuts, but she suffered more severely from shock. She was taken to Hillcrest where she died. Dr. Park was unhurt in the crash. Coroner W. E. Baker said he will make an immediate investigation of the accident.

Funeral services for Mrs. Park will be held at the Noland Brown chapel Thursday afternoon. The Rev. W. C. Cravner of All Souls church, Baltimore, will conduct the services.

Besides her son, Mrs. Park is survived by a brother and a sister, W. W. Rupert and Mrs. Elliott, both of Red Lands, Calif.

No court was held this week owing to the fact that there were but two cases remaining for trial Judge Fleming presided over the Blair county court a brief account of which appears elsewhere in this issue.

From last week: Comm. vs. Wm. T. Lucas, prosecutor, C. I. Gross, State Highway Patrol, Charge, involuntary manslaughter. This is the case wherein Harry Ward of Bellefonte lost his life on the Snow Shoe mountain. Defendant stood trial and was convicted and sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1.00 and serve not less than nine months nor more than eighteen months in the county jail.

Comm. vs. Clarence McCool; prosecutor, A. C. Pfaffle, Highway Patrolman. Charge, involuntary manslaughter by automobile. This is the case wherein Lois Delaney lost her life at the Blue Ball turn on returning from a Madisonburg festival. The defendant plead not guilty, and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and not to have nor drive an automobile for a period of three years.

Comm. vs. Wm. Carr, breaking and entering, penitentiary. Defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$1.00 and from one to five years in the penitentiary.

Comm. vs. Marin Dunlap, assault and battery; prosecutor, Julia Mothersbaugh. Verdict was not guilty and the prosecutor and defendant each to pay one-half of the costs.

Comm. vs. Martin Dunlap, perjury. Prosecutor, Raymond Carson. Verdict of guilty and sentenced to pay costs of prosecution, and 30 days in county jail, and not permitted to testify in any litigation by reason of the conviction of perjury.

Comm. vs. Eugene Kenny, assault and battery. Prosecutor, F. Parline Morton. Verdict of not guilty and the costs divided between the prosecutor and the defendant.

Comm. vs. Kenneth John Baird, statutory offense. Prosecutor, Irene Rhoads. Verdict of not guilty on account of insufficient testimony.

Comm. vs. D. S. Motts, violation of the liquor laws. Prosecutor, Claude Jeffers, patrolman. The defendant plead guilty and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, a fine of \$400.00 and from four to 8 months in the Allegheny county work house.
