W. C. T. U. IN CONVENTION.

Hold Forty-Fifth Annual County Convention in M. E. Church, Pleasant Gap, Friday.

The three sessions for the forty-fifth annual county convention of the W. C. T. U., held at Pleasant Gap, in the Methodist church, Friday, were largely attended. The extensive program as outlined previously was carried out almost in every detail. The president, Mrs. W. A. Broyles, of State College, was the presiding officer. Most of the local societies were represented by delegates and visitors, and twelve unions reported having reached the standard of excellence, and received prizes. "Gold Stars" prizes were won by Juliana, Port Matilda, Unionville, Pleasant Gap, Wingate, Bellefonte and Runville unions for having gained ten per cent. or more in membership. Gold W. C. T. U. pins were presented the Pleasant Gap, Runville and Tusseyville societies for having had all dues paid prior to February 1st.

Twelve local presidents were introduced and each gave an account of special work done.

Mrs. Witmer, of Wingate, reported the organization of "Temperance Light Bearers." Under the direction of Mrs. F. V. Goodhart, leader of Y. P. B. branches, Misses Evelyn Colyer and Allice Burkholder gave glowing accounts of the State convention at Elizabethtown.

"The Sick Baby" and "John Barleycorn" were the titles of two pageants rendered by the Pleasant Gap Legion, Miss Gill, superintendent.

Among the resolutions read was one asking the radio broadcasting corporations to refrain from alluding to the cigarette as "harmless."

The music throughout the sessions was under the direction of Mrs. Grace Allis.

The membership of the organization in the county is 722 with 49 honorary members. State College has the largest union, with 211 members. During the past year five State and National workers were in the county.

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Sow Timothy Seed—Timothy may be seeded as late as the middle of September, or even later in some sections, with a fairly good chance of coming through a normal winter and producing a good crop of hay next year, according to Penn State farm crop specialists.

Promote Rural Life—Good leadership, "fellowship," and fellowship are all needed to build up a better and more satisfying country life.

House Laying Pallets—House the laying pallets when they are ready to start laying. Grade all pallets as to maturity when housing them.

Cull the Dairy Herd—Where feed supplies are short it is much better to dispose of some of the lower producing dairy cows than to keep the entire herd throughout the winter on short rations.

Sweet Clover Helps—Farmers who plowed down sweet clover for this year's crop of potatoes have been surprised at the way the spuds have resisted the drought, in comparison with potatoes preceded by other crops. Crop specialists of the State College say that the sweet clover not only adds humus to the soil but also furnishes a source of readily available nitrogen in large amounts.

Protect Farm Tools—Rust and ruin seek what they may destroy. Have you housed the farm tools which have served their purpose for the present season? Some farmers have learned, much to their loss, that the weather wears out a ma-
