**Reformed Churchmen's League.**

An appeal that the laymen of the Reformed Church in the United States affiliate themselves with the Reformed Churchmen's League now being organized in various sections of the country, was made this week by J. Q. Truxal. The League, which was organized a year ago "to stimulate" interest in men's activities within the Church, is conducted by a committee of prominent religious leaders, of which Mr. Truxal, an elder and vice-president of the General Synod, is the secretary.  
Nine chapters of the League already have been formed, according to Mr. Truxal, and many more are in process of organization. When there are five chapters in a Classis, they will constitute a Classical League. This work is being largely financed by private gifts of laymen. The executive committee of the League at a meeting just held has outlined the program for the coming year. There is much undefined interest in men's work within the Reformed Church congregations which might well be capitalized and crystallized. Christian men, when leagued together, will stimulate each other and the work will contribute moral and spiritual power to industry and citizenship.

With the destruction of a large barn belonging to A. W. Aufer, of Port Trevorton, and located near Dunfords, with a loss of \$10,000, the ninth barn in Snyder county was burned since last spring. All fires were of unknown origin.

**KEISTER.**—William Keister, of Clintondale, a Civil War veteran, passed away at the Lock Haven hospital, on Monday, at the age of 87 years. He had a long term of enlistment and had large experience in front line service. During his last days, while death was gripping him, he fought over many of these horrid front line scenes.  
Mr. Keister was born in Nittany Valley and had been a lifelong resident there. He served with Company E, 7th Pennsylvania Cavalry. He had for many years been a member of the Clintondale Evangelical church.  
Surviving are three sons and three daughters: Russell, of Clintondale; Charles, of Johnsonburg; Robert and Mrs. Eva Wolfe, of Bellevue, Ohio; Mrs. Cornefa Erin, of Ridgway, and Mrs. Beck, of Mill Hall. A sister, Elmira Ohl, of Bellevue also survives.  
Interment was made in Cedar Hill cemetery, near Mill Hall, Wednesday afternoon.  
The deceased was a brother-in-law of A. M. Riegel, of Centre Hall.

**JOHN NEFF SUFFERING FROM COW'S KICK**

**RURAL MAIL SERVICE POSSIBLE FOR WOODWARD**

There is a possibility that a rural mail route will be established from the Millheim post office to serve the section east of that place to Woodward. The patrons about Woodward are favorable toward such a service being introduced, believing that their mail facilities will be greatly superior with it than at present.  
A survey of the section proposed to be covered by the route was recently made by an inspector who is a special man for that special work. So far as the public knows, the inspector has not made a report.

**Bitner Property Sold for \$2,500.**

The William Bitner property, near Tusseyville, consisting of thirty-three acres and buildings, was sold on Saturday at public sale to Frank Dashner for the consideration of \$2,500. The lands adjoin the farm owned and occupied by Mr. Dashner.  
Irvin Burris and M. F. Rossman are said to have been unsuccessful bidders for the property.

**Phillipsburg Has \$200,000 Fire.**

The plant of the Lansberry Hardware company, in Phillipsburg, was destroyed by fire Tuesday morning with a loss of \$200,000.  
The adjacent warehouse of the Jones Hardware company was also burned with a loss of slightly more than \$2,000.  
A wall separating the Lansberry company building from the Rowland theatre saved that structure.  
When firemen poured a stream of water on the building a large quantity of carbide stored within exploded, sending the flames to every part of the building.  
Fire apparatus from several nearby towns came to help fight the flames and prevent them from spreading. Several firemen were injured, but none seriously.

**VISUAL RADIO RANGE BEACON INSTALLED ON AIR-MAIL ROUTE**

**Bellefonte Intermediate Landing Field Equipped With Apparatus for Guidance of Pilots.**

The visual range beacon—a device for guiding pilots along a given course by radio beams which are "seen" by the armen, and which was conceived by the Aeronautics Branch of the Department of Commerce nearly three years ago as a promising aid to air navigation, has been installed for practical service trials on the Federal airway between New York and Cleveland, and was announced by Clarence M. Young, assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics.  
"The visual beacon transmitting station now is in continuous 24-hour operation at the Department of Commerce intermediate landing field at Bellefonte, the midway stopping point between New York and Cleveland," Mr. Young said. "The aural type radio range beacon, which is in regular use on the Cleveland-New York airway, will remain in operation to provide radio direction for planes not equipped to receive the visual beacon signals. Tests conducted by radio engineers of the Aeronautics Branch show that the visual beacon signals do not interfere with the signals from the rural beacon transmitting station.  
"The aural beacon indicates position with respect to the course by means of two code signals, an 'N' (dash-dot) and an 'A' (dot-dash), which are picked up through ear phones by pilots in flight. When on one side of the course, the 'N' is louder, while on the other side the 'A' predominates in strength. When the pilot is on the course, the two signals merge into a long dash.  
"The visual beacon receiver is an indicator contained in a simple, rugged box mounted on the instrument board. In this box there are two strips of metal, called 'reeds' which are mounted side by side. The tips of metal are white and are visible through the face of the instrument.  
"When the beacon signals are received, the two reeds vibrate vertically. The vibrating is hardly noticeable, the picture conveyed to the eye consisting of two broad white vertical ribbons, varying, of course, according to the adjustment of the receiving set, from an eighth of an inch to a quarter of an inch or more in length.  
"When the two white lines are equal in length, the airplane is on the course. A deviation from this course to the left reeds or white line and reduces the other, and vice versa. The longer reed shows the side the plane is off the course.  
"Eleven transport planes flying the New York-Cleveland airway in scheduled service now are being equipped with the visual type receiving sets.  
"The visual type beacon is the result of nearly three years of research, laboratory experiments and flight tests carried on by the Aeronautics Research Division of the Aeronautics Branch at the College Park, Maryland, experimental station. It is being operated as an aid to air navigation by the Airways Division of the Aeronautics Branch."

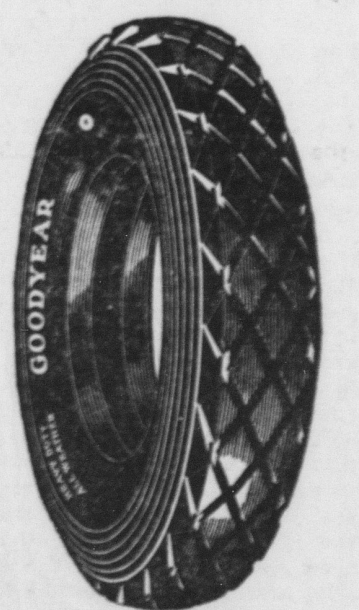
