At the November election the voters in the borough of State College will give expression for or against the issuing of bonds in the sum of \$119,000 for the purpose of building and equipping a high school unit, to be located on the southeast corner of Frazer street and Nittany avenue, adjacent to the present high school, and facing Nittany avenue. The school board argues that the loan can be made and cancelled without raising the present millage, which now is 25 mills.

On May 3, 1931, it will be one hundred years since the elder Spicher was born. Only once in the recollection of Mrs. Hockenbury, who is the youngest of the family, did all of the brothers and sisters meet, and that was at the time of the death of the father. The concrete blocks forming the outer walls of the enlarged Booser storage garage are being erected under contract by H. J. Markie, of Pleasant Gap, who manufactures the blocks, and in this case lays them. The laying of the blocks is being done by B. H. Saverpool and F. H. Thomas, of State College.

Mr. Markie has also taken the contract for building a dwelling house on the Clarence Haugh farm, near Murray school house, to take the place of the frame dwelling burned a few weeks ago. The work is going on at both the Booser garage and on the dwelling house at this time.

FEEDING WELL FROM BELLEFONTE SPRING

Scarcity of water at the Sheffield milk plant, at Centre Hall, forced the company to haul water into the well supplying a portion of the water used in preparing milk for shipment to New York City. One of the company's large six-thousand-gallon glass tanks was used for this purpose. The tank was taken to Bellefonte where it was filled from the spring supplying that town with water and hauled by freight back to the plant. The water was emptied into the a drilled well, which fortunately proved a good container. This process is rather expensive, but is warranted.

The water supply for the Sheffield plant is furnished by a drilled well and a spring, altogether separate from the borough water system.

Receivers' Bill Pared.

The hearing on the objections filed to the report of the former board of receivers in the Centre County Bank case, held on Monday before Lee Francis Lybarger, of Millifflburg, referee in bankruptcy, was held in Bellefonte.

The referee allowed the three receivers—John S. Ginter, a former Tyrore banker; John S. Dale, State College, and Rev. Steely, president of the Farmers National Bank, Bellefonte, \$911.00 for their services. The sum allowed was on the basis of 5 per cent on the first \$500.00 collected; 5 per cent on \$15,000 and one per cent on the remainder. The trustees had made a charge of \$7500.00 for this service and had withdrawn \$1600.00 from the funds in their hands.

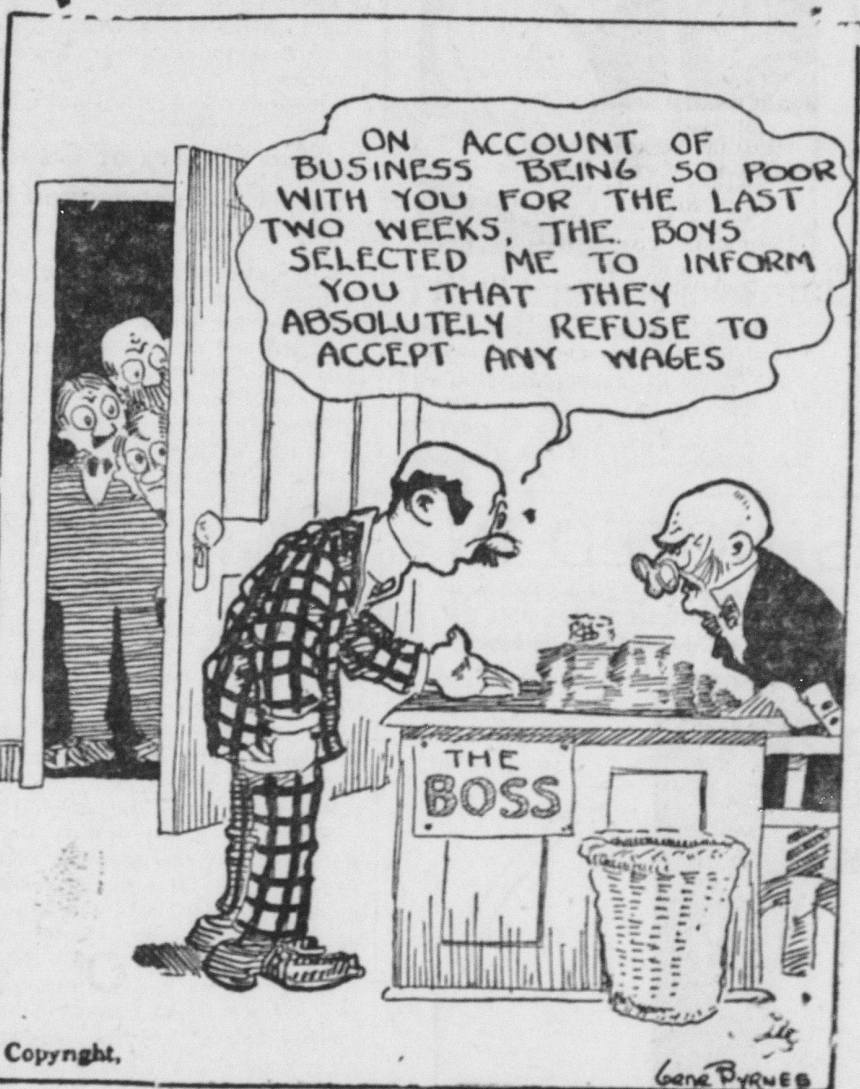

Two Decrees Given.

Two decrees were handed down by Judge M. Ward Fleming on Saturday, one affecting the usage of court records by attorneys, and the other a matter of court procedure. The first decree states that in the past a number of papers and records had been removed from the files of the Clerk of Court by attorneys and other persons, and never returned. In the future, the consent of the Clerk or his deputy must be secured before any papers are removed and a written receipt, stating the nature of the papers or records, must be given the clerk. The second decree states that all applications for continuance of cases must be made in open court and that counsel for the opposing parties must be notified in advance. Where continuances are requested because of illness of a party of material witness a doctor's certificate must be filed with the application for continuance and made a part of the court record.
