FARM CALENDAR

TIMELY REMINDERS FROM PENNSYLVANIA STATE COLLEGE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE

Weather Reports by Radio—Every day except Saturdays and Sundays weather reports and timely news items are broadcast from WPSC at the Pennsylvania State College, promptly at 12 o'clock noon. The station operates on 1230 kilocycles and 500 watts.

Care for Seed Corn—As a result of the dry weather and its effect on the corn crop, seed corn will be a highly valuable product next spring. Good care of old corn and all new corn that can be used for seed will be a profitable procedure for any farmer.

Timber Sale Drops—The general business depression has extended to the market for logs and lumber. Prices are low and there is little movement in this line. The best practice now includes letting valuable trees stand or cutting only after sale has been contracted.

Give Cows Rest Period—Cows need vacations the same as human being. A rest period of 6 to 8 weeks before freshening, with plenty of good feed, will put the dairy cow in form for her winter's work.

Save Wheat from Smut—It is especially important that late planted wheat be treated with copper carbonate dust to protect it from the ravages of smut.

Provide 1931 Hay—In considering emergency hay crops for next year, it is well to remember that oats, wheat, soybeans and other crops can be used. Using this year's meadows for hay again next year is another possibility, even if it does upset the rotation. In most cases a heavy yield can be expected if the field is fertilized early in the spring.

Control Late Blight—Spray celery every 10 to 14 days with 4-4-50 bordeaux mixture to control late blight, as the cool fall weather promotes the development of this disease.
