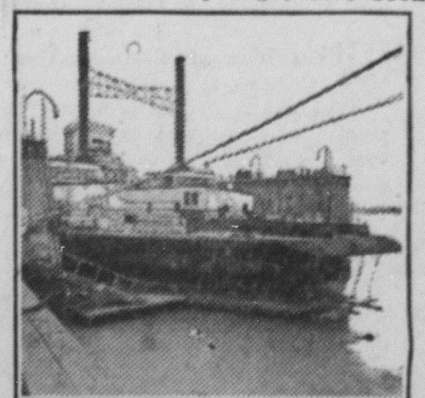

Old War Monitor Reduced to Lowly Service

Not long ago, at a shipyard in New Orleans, a stout ferryboat belonging to the Texas-Pacific-Missouri Railroad was hauled up for repairs. Registered as the Gouldsboro, she had been knocking around without having been in dry-dock since 1916; and nobody knew what her earlier history might have been.

On examination, her hull was found to be of wrought iron, a material which went out of use for ships' plates a good half century ago, but which is known to have greater resistance to corrosion, especially in sea water, than materials now in favor.

Under the accumulation of paint and scale, identifying marks were discovered. "Chickasaw!" It was not difficult now to revive her story. The Gouldsboro is in fact the Chickasaw, built in 1863, one of Admiral Farragut's monitors in the battle of Mobile Bay in 1864. A war relic reduced to lowly service!

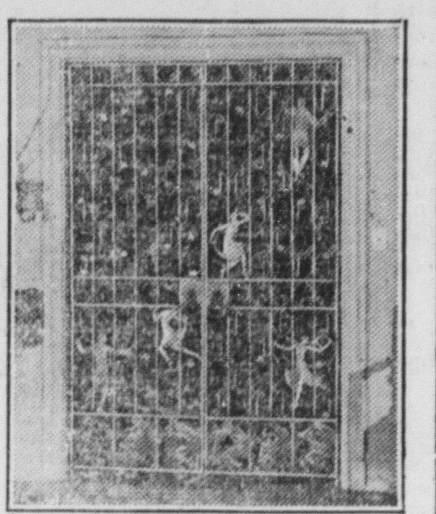

Roxy's Wrought Iron Gates

A highly individual and daring piece of work in wrought iron is the beautiful pair of gates lately installed in the New York apartment of S. L. Rothafel.

The daring consists in a symbolic representation of the owner himself, "Roxy," as he is familiarly known to the American public. He is introduced as the genius or personification of music, holding in his hand threads that run out to control minor figures representative of song, instrumental music and the dance as employed in his famed "Cathedral of the Movies." The treatment of this novel subject matter, however, is characterized by restraint. It embodies such feeling for the possibilities of wrought iron, such respect for the time-honored marks of smithcraft, that it has been greatly praised.—Wrought Iron Record.

Water Wheel Floots

A water wheel has been invented which is designed to adjust itself automatically to the varying height of the propelling stream. As first constructed the wheel has eight V-shaped paddles about 13 feet long and 14 inches wide, and it is so mounted on an upright tank that it rises and falls with the river's changes through any height up to 36 feet. It is used for pumping irrigating water from a distance of 250 feet to a height of 70 feet above the source. Pumps and gearing are placed on the river bank, and the wheel and tank are connected by a shaft having universal couplings at each end.

REFORMED SYNOD TO MEET IN 184TH ANNUAL SESSION

At Allentown, on Monday, in Liberty Bell Church—Work of Synod During Past Year.

The 184th annual sessions of the Eastern Synod of the Reformed Church in the U. S. will open in the Old Historic Zion Reformed church, "The Liberty Bell Church," Allentown, Monday evening, October 13th, at 7:45 o'clock, May 7th, 1792 at Philadelphia. It is the Rev. Simon Sipple, D. D., pastor.

Zion Reformed church was organized in 1762, when the village was called Northampton, and while only 13 huts formed the town. In September 1777, when the Liberty Bell was in danger of being captured by the British, it was secured under the floor of the old church and thus kept from falling into the hands of the enemy. The Eastern Synod is the oldest of the seven district Synods in the Reformed Church. It was organized May 7th, 1792 at Philadelphia. It includes 412 ministers, 13 licentiates, 321

charges and 581 congregations, and a total communicant membership of 332. In addition to this, there are 543 baptized members. During the third year ending December 31, this Synod contributed \$450,221 for benevolent work and \$1,692,635 for congregational purposes. A very conservative estimate of the value of its church properties is \$20,758,500, and its parsonages are valued at \$2,962,850. There are 1,037 of its young people attending colleges and higher institutions of learning. Confirmations during the two-thirds of a year numbered 1,624 and infant baptisms numbered 3,882. The total Sunday school enrollment is 145,442. There are 12,886 Sunday school teachers. The Eastern Synod met in Allentown in 1919. The communicant membership then was 138,525.

The Synod has under its care, conjointly with the Potomac Synod and the Pittsburgh Synod, the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Church, and the Franklin and Marshall College and Academy, at Lancaster. About 20 years ago it also assumed the responsibility for Cedar Crest College and more recently for the Phoebe Home at Allentown.
