

#### Water Wheel Floots

A water wheel has been invented which is designed to adjust itself auto natically to the varying height of the propelling stream. As first construct ed the wheel has eight V-shaped paddies about 13 feet long and 14 inches wide, and it is so mounted on an air tight tank that it rises and falls with the river's changes through any height up to 36 feet. It is used for pumping irrigating water from a distance of 280 feet to a height of 70 feet above the source. Pumps and gearing are placed on the river bank, and the wheel and tank are connected by a shaft having universal couplings at each end.
