HON, W. I. SWOPE DEAD.

Was Prominent in Republican Activities for Half Century and Widely Known Attorney.-Served as Congressman and District Attorney.

Former Congressman W. I. Swope, prominent in Republican activities, a leader in political work for half a century and one of the most widely known attorneys in the State, died at his home in Clearfield early Thursday morning.

Mr. Swope was 68 years old. He had been a semi-invalid since suffering He was born in Clearfield October 4,

He also served as a delegate to the Republican National convention at Ch/cago in 1916.

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


