The deceased was aged 69 years and 18 days. She was the daughter of Henry and Sarah (Harter) DeWiler. She is survived by her husband and the following children: Aden, of Nittany; Milford M., of Rebersburg; Charles C., of Canton, Ohio; Mrs. Mabel Gentz, of Maple Park, Ill.; Wm. R. Garrett, of Canton, Ohio, and Harry H., of Lock Haven.

LINGLE.—Gladys Viola Lingle, aged fourteen years, died at the Centre County Hospital, Wednesday of last week, where she was a patient being treated for chronic valvular heart disease. She was the daughter of Mrs. Clarence Bressler by a former marriage, of Rote's Mill, west of Coburn. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. R. Schectery and interment made in Millheim, on Saturday forenoon.

SPANGLER.—Mrs. John Spangler died at her home at Rebersburg Saturday forenoon from the effects of an apoplectic stroke suffered some time ago. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning; interment at Rebersburg. Rev. J. R. Schectery, pastor of the Evangelical church, had the service in charge.

The deceased was the second wife of Mr. Spangler (the first wife, also deceased, was Miss Annie Stoner, of Potter township), and was a daughter of Moses and Amanda Frantz. She was aged 59 years, 7 months and 5 days. She is survived by her husband, but no children.

JORDAN.—Mrs. Anna Cora Jordan, relict of the late Adam Jordan, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Emanuel Vonada, near Wolfe's Chapel, from complications arising from dropsy and heart trouble.

Deceased was a daughter of John and Julian (Moyer) Weaver and was born in Penn township, November 17, 1865, being aged, therefore, 61 years, 10 months and 19 days.

She held membership formerly in the Green Grove Evangelical church in Penn township.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Vonada, a brother, John Weaver, of Coburn, and two sisters, Mrs. Candace Ream, of Millheim, and Mrs. Lulu Oyster, of Milton.

ZERBY.—Miss Minnah Zerby, who has made her home in Bellefonte with the G. P. Gentzel family since she was a child, died at the Centre County hospital from complications arising from an attack of paralysis and a broken hip. FREED.—John Levi Freed, for many years a resident of Lumber City, near Reedsville, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Leroy Leshar, of Shamokin, of injuries received when he fell from a stone wall two weeks ago. He was aged 77 years and had been an employe of the Standard Steel Works and a member of the Havico Valley Evangelical church. The funeral was held in the Milroy Methodist church. He is survived by the following sons and daughters: Wm. H., of Hawstone; Mrs. John (Jennie) Bohn, of Centre Hall; Walter, of Lumber City; Mrs. Leroy (Rebecca) Leshar, of Shamokin, Solomon and Joseph, of Lumber City, and Orval, of Altoona.

LYON.—John Porter Lyon, aged 58 years, died at his home in Bellefonte, Thursday morning, following a brief illness with heart trouble. He was born at Pennsylvania Furnace and received his early education at the Birmingham School for Boys. Later he attended school at Lawrenceville, N. J., and was graduated from Drexel Institute, Philadelphia. In addition to his wife, he is survived by a son and a daughter.

HON. W. I. SWOPE DEAD.

Was Prominent in Republican Activities for Half Century and Widely Known Attorney.—Served as Congressman and District Attorney.

Former Congressman W. I. Swope, prominent in Republican activities, a leader in political work for half a century and one of the most widely known attorneys in the State, died at his home in Clearfield early Thursday morning.

Mr. Swope was 68 years old. He had been a semi-invalid since suffering a stroke a year ago.

He was born in Clearfield October 4, 1862, and, following his graduation from Harvard university, entered law practice in Clearfield.

During his youth, he gained the sobriquet of "the boy orator of the Susquehanna." He was gifted with a pleasing address and an eloquent speaking voice.

Mr. Swope served as District Attorney in Clearfield county for two successive terms, from 1900 to 1905. In 1922 he was chosen as this district's representative in Congress on the Republican ticket and served with distinction in the lower house from 1922 to 1926.

He also served as a delegate to the Republican National convention at Chicago in 1916.

The death of Mr. Swope marks the third death within a week of prominent residents of Clearfield. Former Judge Singleton Bell died at Cleveland on Saturday previous, and J. Frank Snyder, well known throughout the State, died on Monday morning previous.

Mr. Swope is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Hartwick Swope.

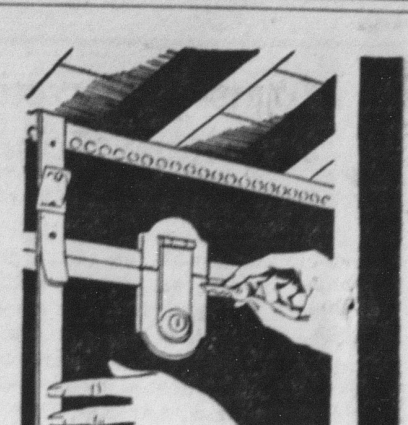
