GREGG TOWNSHIP VOCATIONAL SCHOOL NOTES

COMMUNITY FAIR AT SPRING MILLS ENJOYED BY LARGE CROWD

The thirteenth annual Gregg Township Vocational School at Spring Mills last Friday and Saturday was most successful. Weather conditions were ideal for such an event, and as a result large crowds were present both days. All meetings, contests and other events were well attended, and those present entered into the activities with a fine spirit. One of the surprises was the exceptionally large and fine display of agricultural products. There were approximately 2500 exhibits of farm products which far surpasses the number of exhibits of any previous fair. This excellent record was made in spite of the unfavorable season for farm products, and reveals the good work of the students and citizens of the township. Canning, baking and sewing exhibits were also larger than usual, and the quality throughout the entire show was of a high order, according to the judges. Winners of the various contests, etc., are given below.

The Health playlets and both evening programs held in the Grange hall were well attended and enjoyed by the folks who were able to get into the building. Music on two occasions by the Spring Mills band and the comedy, "Squaring It With the Boss," were some of the features of the programs. The Baseball Voc. School dodge ball and soccer teams were defeated by the G. T. V. S. teams. Both contests were exciting and held interest until the final whistle. The G. T. V. S. girls won 28-5 and the local boys won 4-3, booting the fourth goal through 25 seconds before the close of the game. About 130 people enjoyed the chicken supper on Friday night which was prepared and served by the Home Economics Department. The fair was a successful one from every standpoint. Interest is growing from year to year and the success it has attained is due to the fine spirit exhibited by the school children, business organizations, farmers and other interested citizens in the township.

The LockHaven-Renovo highway was formally opened to the public yesterday (Wednesday.)

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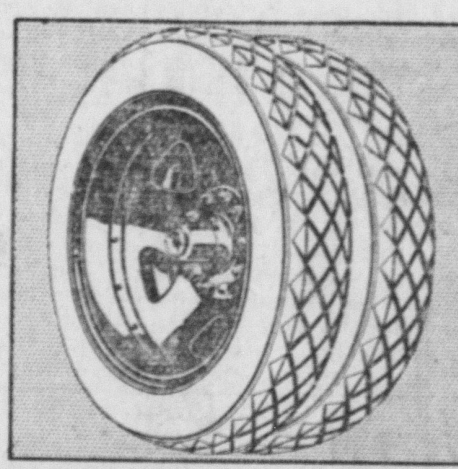
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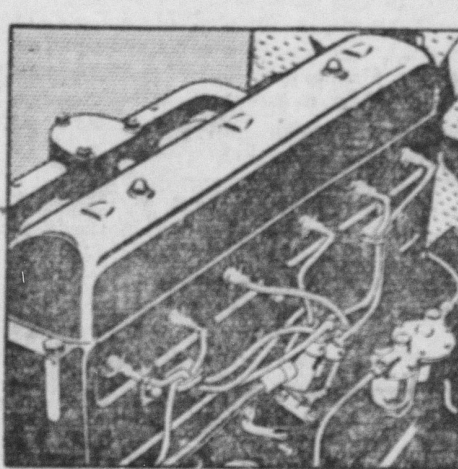
