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**CENTRE COUNTY HOSPITAL  
CORPORATION MEETING**

**New Members of Board Elected—953  
Patients Treated—Number of Pa-  
tient Days Increases One-Third—  
Financial Statement.**

The annual corporate meeting of the  
Centre County Hospital was held at  
the Court House in Bellefonte with a  
small representation present. Due to  
the beneficial work done by the in-  
stitution during the past number of  
years, it was a great disappointment to  
the officers and directors of the lack  
of interest shown by the citizens and  
following the reading of the reports  
of the treasurer, George C. Bingham,  
and Manager William H. Brown, the  
meeting adjourned.

Five new members of the board of  
trustees were elected as follows: H. J.  
Smith of Snow Shoe, who fills the vacan-  
cy caused by the resignation of  
David Chambers; J. Thompson Henry,  
of Martha, re-elected; J. Randall Mill-  
heim, elected for a full term after fill-  
ing the unexpired term of the late  
Squire Shelton; F. V. Goodhart, of  
Centre Hall, replacing Frank Carson;  
and Sumner J. Wolfe, of Howard, re-  
placing T. A. Fletcher. The new board

met on Tuesday evening and elected  
officers as follows: J. Thompson Hen-  
ry, of Martha, president; J. Randall  
Miller, Millheim, vice president; M. M.  
Cobb, Bellefonte, secretary, and Geo.  
C. Bingham, Bellefonte, treasurer.  
The following is taken from Mr.  
Brown's report:

Number of full pay patients treated  
during the year, 660; part pay pa-  
tients, 433; unable to pay anything,  
250; total patients, 953. Total num-  
ber of patient days, 12,199; average  
number of days spent by each pa-  
tient, 13.

That the work carried on by the hos-  
pital during the past year has mat-  
terially increased is shown by the fact  
that the number of patient days dur-  
ing the year were 33% more than in  
the previous year; the cost of main-  
tenance was 24% greater, which cost  
includes a number of improvements;  
and that the total income was 37%  
greater than the previous year.

While the total costs of main-  
tenance, improvements and repairs is  
shown by the books to be \$48,018.35,  
and \$49,316.98 total receipts for the  
year, due to the efficient and econ-  
omical management during the period,  
an actual deficit of \$763.87 exists be-  
cause of a deduction of over \$2,000  
from the State appropriation was paid  
during the previous year.

The report also states that if, in the  
future, the continued expansion of the  
charitable work as well as the im-  
provement of the institution's facilities  
is contemplated, the amount received  
from the annual drive must be mat-  
terially increased, as well as the am-  
ounts received from both State and  
County appropriations.

The report also mentions briefly the  
contemplated new nurses' home which  
is a crying need of the institution. A  
number of the staff and student  
nurses are now quartered in the third  
floor of the main hospital building,  
the rooms of which are badly needed  
to accommodate extra patients. Dur-

ing the past summer many patients  
have been kept in cots on the sun  
porches, due to the fact that neither  
rooms nor ward space was available.

It is proposed to raise the necessary  
funds for the erection of the home by  
making it a memorial building and  
persons contributing can designate  
either themselves or any other person  
in whose memory they wish their  
contributions known. A suitable tab-  
let will be placed listing those who  
contributed or those in whose honor  
the contribution was made.

**Choose Good Sire—**

Provide now for a better milk pro-  
ducing inheritance in your future herd.  
Use a good sire from a line of breed-  
ing better than that now represented  
in the herd.

**Hear Radio Talks—**

Timely talks on farm and garden  
topics are given at noon Monday,

**Leaves Are Useful—**

Leaves make a good fertilizer when  
spaded into the garden soil. They also  
make a good mulch and protection  
to rose bushes and shrubs from dam-  
age by frost.

**Train Colt Early—**

The education of the colt should not  
be postponed until it is desired to  
break him as a 3-year-old. The colt  
should be broken to the use of the  
halter early and prevented from be-  
coming willful and headstrong.

**Provide Protection—**

Tender evergreens can be protected  
with straw, evergreen boughs, corn  
fodder, or burlap. Free circulation of  
air should be allowed.

**Grow Profitable Crops—**

In planning next year's work, try  
a system which will include several  
of the crops most profitable in the  
region over a period of years.

**Store Root Crops—**

You can store vegetable root crops  
in a barred outdoors if it is well cov-  
ered with layers of soil and straw or  
leaves. The barrel head makes a good  
door.

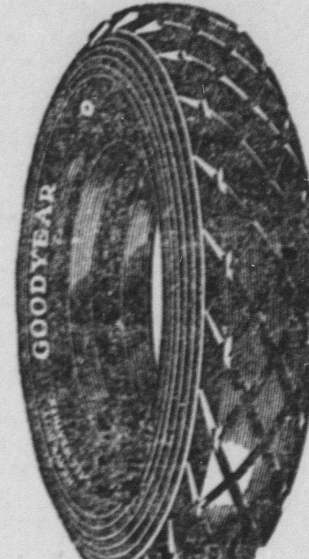
